appy November! As the weather continues to get colder, I think of the Thanksgiving that we will celebrate with friends and family. It's a wonderful reminder of how lucky we are to have the things that have blessed our lives.

It's also a reminder of the struggles our ancestors endured, and a reminder that others still struggle with difficulties in their lives. Some may have struggles in their personal lives and relationships with others. Some may lack food or shelter or both. Some may be experiencing a devastating life change or a loss through death.

As we thank God this Thanksgiving for the many gifts we have, it's important that we remember those who are in need, and that we help them when we can.

In Waukesha, I've been blessed to work with BEGIN — the Brookfield-Elm Grove Interfaith Network. I have made wonderful connections with clergy and lay leaders from the different faiths in our area. We work together with great respect and support of each other.

This year, CEEW will host the BEGIN Thanksgiving service on Wednesday, Nov. 14<sup>th</sup> at 7 p.m. (Please see Joe Dailey's story on Page 3.) It is always a wonderful service with gratitude as its theme.

It is especially important in this day and age to reach out to our friends of other faiths. Our congregation, like many other Jewish congregations, has many interfaith families. We embrace the non-Jewish partners. Many of them become very active at our Temple,

sometimes becoming as active at our congregation as their Jewish partners.

Interfaith connections are especially important today because of recent public animosity toward minority religions. Through understanding, tolerance and mutual respect for each other, we learn what it truly means to practice the teaching of the Torah "to love your neighbor as yourself" which Rabbi Akiva called "the major principle of the Torah." As Jews, we believe that God is the God of all human beings, without regard to how people practice their beliefs.

One of the first rabbis of this congregation, **Rabbi Manfred Swarsensky**, survived the Holocaust after being imprisoned by the Nazis in his native Germany. He made it part of his life's work to promote good interfaith relationships in his community.

He believed in building bridges. He was on the Madison Ministerial Association and attended the Ministers Breakfast at Bethel Church. He was on many interfaith boards and committees, and was a member of the Governor's Equal Rights Commission.

He was probably the only rabbi of that time period who performed interfaith weddings. He travelled far to accommodate interfaith couples who wanted Jewish weddings. He taught at (Catholic) Edgewood College in Madison. He was definitely a trailblazer in the area of interfaith work, perhaps because he saw what the isolation of Jews in Germany did to our people in the Holocaust. You can't have peace with someone you don't talk to or know.

Please join us for our interfaith service on Nov. 14<sup>th</sup>, as we rejoice in our diversity and offer joyous praise and thanks to God this Thanksgiving.

The service, usually scheduled for the week before Thanksgiving, moves from congregation to congregation. It is open to the public.

# Serving on Temple Board is a mitzvah, so ...

he Temple president constitutes a Nominating Committee to seek members who are interested in serving the community as an officer or trustee.

This committee usually begins its work in March so that a slate of candidates is ready in time for the annual meeting of the membership on the first Sunday of June each year.

This year is different for a few reasons. First, one of the areas that emerged as needing change when we did our Assessment and Benchmarking project was how we choose, train, and support our leaders. We've known this for a long time, but haven't known what to do or where to start. I thought one simple thing we could do would be to start approaching people sooner and give them some time to consider this mitzvah.

Another change we can make is to speak with members personally rather than sending emails or leaving messages. Although the assessment told us that many members say they feel the leadership is transparent and communicates well, I'm not entirely sure most members know what exactly is involved in serving as a leader at CEEW.

It's more than simply attending a Board meeting once a month, but hardly a full-time job either. The position is what you make of it. Most people come to realize there's a good deal of reward in serving as a Temple leader and find ways to make the mitzvah of service even more meaningful. This can occur whether you put in two hours or 10 on a project or task beyond the monthly Board meeting.

As I've been explaining since the last annual meeting in June, my second term ends on June 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2019, when our

community meets to elect new leadership. I anticipate that by then a candidate for the president's job will have emerged and will have received some training. This person will have coaches on hand — former presidents — for advice and guidance.

The same is true of *all* officers and trustees. We hope to devise a formal training session so that anyone who is interested in exploring a leadership role or who is entering one can get an idea of "the ropes" before taking hold of them.

Our governance functions under principles of Jewish ethics and democracy, seasoned freely with respect and good humor. Robert's Rules helps, and so does common sense.

Board members tend to linger after adjournment. Some even head to a

local watering hole for a "subcommittee meeting" when the spirit moves them.

We have vigorous discussions without rancor. We get things done. I'm proud of the direction our leadership has taken in this regard in recent years.

The Nominating Committee at present includes three Board members: Mark Levy, Laurie Schwartz, and Sandy Villa. I have asked them to find two non-Board members to serve with them.

If any of these five people contact you about serving our community, please listen and consider this mitzvah. Ask questions about the role, as it may be quite different from your perception. Call a current or former board member and ask what it's like to serve on the Board before saying "no."

You may find it's a good idea to say "yes" just this once.

# Confirmation class learning hot topics, ethics

ovember coincides on the Jewish calendar with the month of *Cheshvan*.

It is often called "Mar" Cheshvan meaning "bitter" Cheshvan, because this month does not have any Jewish holidays. On the Gregorian calendar however we think of Thanksgiving during the month of November.

#### **During October:**

The 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> grade, and the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> grade Religious School students have been busy learning about the Book of Genesis, because this is the first of the five books of the Torah, which we started reading after the holiday of Simchat Torah.

1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> graders are starting to learn the letters of the *aleph bet*.

3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> graders are beginning a "pretend" trip to Israel.

5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders have begun learning about the prophets and Jewish history.

The confirmation class learned with **Ann Meyers** focusing on two of the "hot topics": "Disagreement and Debate" and "Hack Your Newsfeed."

Joe Dailey taught during October as the class focused on Jewish ethical principles, values, social norms, and *Pirkei Avot (The Ethics of the Fathers)*.

October 28<sup>th</sup>: The 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade students and Confirmation class head to Congregation Sinai to hear Dr. Irene Butter, a well-known peace activist, Holocaust survivor and Professor Emerita of Public Health at the University of Michigan. She is talking about her experience during World War II, stressing the





# Jewish woman a champion in gymnastics and in fighting sexual abuse

Alv Raisman to speak at Shalom on Nov. 13th

Aly Raisman became perhaps the most famous Jewish athlete in the world when she won three Olympic gold medals — six medals total – and was captain of the victorious 2012 and 2016 U.S. women's gymnastics teams.

She became the darling of the global Jewish community when her flawless floor exercise routine that netted an individual gold medal in 2012 in London was set to the Jewish folk song Hava Nagilah. She then announced her support for a moment of silence in memory of the Israeli athletes killed by a Palestinian terrorist organization at the 1972 Olympics.

Keith Stern, her rabbi at Temple Beth Avodah in Newton, Mass., wrote at the time in The Forward, "She doesn't whisper, 'I'm Jewish.' On the 40th anniversary of the Munich Massacre she twists, jumps, flies through the air, declaring with every muscle in her strong body, 'I am a strong Jewish woman and I



own this event.' Can there be a clearer declaration of Jewish power and pride?"

But now she is on a different mission one to fight sexual abuse. She will speak at Congregation Shalom on Tuesday, Nov. 13<sup>th</sup>, at 6:45 p.m. The event is the Launch of SHOFAR (Safeguarding Healthy Families and Relationships) initiative during which Raisman will talk about her experience as a survivor of sexual abuse and her journey as an elite gymnast.

Admission is free, but reservations are required to guarantee a seat. Go to https://app.mobilecause.com/form/ ovvSXw.

Raisman, who is also a vocal advocate of eliminating bullying and encouraging body positivity in women and girls, is the most prominent gymnast to criticize USA Gymnastics for what she saw as its inadequate response to more than 100 accusations of sexual assault against Larry Nassar, a team doctor for 29 years.

Raisman, now 24, was one of dozens of women who made victim impact statements at the sentencing hearing of Nassar, who pleaded quilty to multiple counts of first-degree criminal sexual assault in state court. The judge made it clear that she did not intend for Nassar to ever be free again

Defiant and confident, Raisman read a strong statement confronting Nassar, who she says sexually abused her for years — beginning when she was 15 while she trained on the U.S. national

Raisman, who placed fourth on ABC's Dancing With the Stars in 2013 and has written a book, Fierce: How Competing for Myself Changed Everything, was raised in a Reform Jewish home and had a fashion-themed Bat Mitzvah party ("I'm a girly girl," she said.)

"I think for me, being Jewish is all about being close with family," she said. "I think it's very family-oriented, which is something that's really important to me. And I think speaking out and being a strong female, I don't think you can be that without the support of your family."

Her new calling makes thinking about a return to competition in time for the 2020 Olympics in Tokyo seem trivial.

'This is the focus," Raisman said. It's a focus on educating young athletes and their parents on the warning signs while also loudly clamoring for change. It has turned her into an unexpected symbol of strength for others who share their experiences.

"I take a lot of pride in being able to not only represent the U.S.A, but also the Jewish community everywhere," Raisman said.
