



CNN notes that of the 1,679 religious hate crimes reported to the FBI in 2017, 58.1 percent were anti-Semitic, while the next largest number was 18.6 percent anti-Muslim.

# Evil tongue, gossip and social media give rise to anti-Semitism

I write this, we've had two shootings murdering 23 people within two weeks, as well as the injuries suffered from them.

One of the shootings was in the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh, killing 11 people — the worst anti-Semitic attack ever in the United States.

The rise of anti-Semitism in this country worries me greatly. I spoke about this in my sermon on Nov. 9<sup>th</sup>, on the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Kristallnacht in Germany and the beginning of the horrendous acts of Hitler and the Holocaust. It is hard to fathom how anyone could have committed the heinous crimes against humankind, murdering six million Jews.

Much of the Holocaust began with *lashon harah*, which is the spreading of lies and gossip about others. German citizens were told that the Jewish people were the cause of all evil in the world, especially in Germany. All the freedoms Jews had enjoyed were soon taken away from them. They could not go to school, teach, practice law or medicine or sell their goods to anyone other than Jews. They were harassed and beaten. Then, of course, things got much worse and the horrors that happened to them are too vast and gruesome to write in this article.

After it was over, we constantly repeated "Never again!" So now, it is up to us and our society to make sure that it never happens again.

Human beings tend to blame things on others. So minorities are often the scapegoats who pay the price for everything and anything that happens in society. Those doing the blaming may never have met the people they are blaming. Or perhaps, they had a bad encounter with one person, and then decided that all people of that minority

(A few days later, **Cantor Martin** combined a memorial service at CEEW with the regular Shabbat service. Cantor Martin gave a moving Dvar Torah, and asked congregants to express their feelings, which several congregants did.)

must be horrible. Once people start talking, it snowballs and pretty soon there is no turning back.

We must nip those types of conversations in the bud. If we are listening to something like this, we must stand up and tell the person they are not right and need to please stop stereotyping a whole group of people because of something one person may have done. "No, not all Jews are rich and greedy or untrustworthy or evil, or ... (fill in the blanks)."

One major problem we have in society is social media. Very nasty things can be posted on Facebook and Twitter,

some of which are dangerous because they blame others and say terrible falsehoods about them.

The man who killed the people at the Pittsburgh synagogue had a horrible post on social media, saying that a Jewish organization that helps give shelter, food and jobs to refugees was letting in the immigrants who were going to kill us so we need to get rid of all of these evil Jews. Louis Farrakhan posted that he wasn't an anti-Semite, he was an anti-termite (a phrase that Hitler used referring to Jews). Facebook

took it off right away, but Twitter left it up. This type of use of social media is lashon harah and promotes hatred, bigotry and violence, and is very dangerous for our children to see.

Children tend to mimic what they see and hear, and what they are seeing and hearing these days isn't pretty.

We must find a way to combat this type letting people say and video anything of horrible speech and bigotry. In my sermon, I suggested that we cancel our Twitter accounts so we don't see and hear this horrible, hateful speech and keep it from our children.

We need to model good behavior, not bad. If we cancel our accounts and encourage others to do the same, in protest to Twitter for allowing this type of bigotry and speech to be allowed, perhaps they will monitor it, instead of

they wish.

On the evening of Dec. 2<sup>nd</sup>, we begin the holiday of Chanukah in celebrating the victory over Syrian oppressors who would not allow Jews to practice their religion.

Let us honor that struggle and fight for freedom in a different way in December 2018, freeing ourselves from the fetters of unfair and dangerous speech around the world.

riting this column is a bit like trying to see into the future: It's written almost three weeks before you receive it out of consideration for the bulletin staff's publication schedule. For you, Thanksgiving has come and gone; for me, it's still in the planning stages (to brine the turkey or not?).

Advance planning has its virtues to be sure, as does spontaneity. Long-range planning has worked well as we've sorted out how to build the framework for our Temple's endowment.

That stage of its development is now complete. Preliminary documents necessary for its formation and function have been drawn up.

## JEWISH COMMUNITY FOUNDATION TO MANAGE OUR ENDOWMENT

The Temple's Board of Trustees voted at its Nov. 12<sup>th</sup> meeting to select the Milwaukee Jewish Federation's Jewish Community Foundation to manage our endowment.

The JCF has many advantages for us in terms of planning our fundraising campaign, marketing the endowment for donations, etc. The specifics of the actual endowment documents can be finalized now that the Board has made the decision of a management entity.

Many synagogues, Jewish families and individuals also have charitable funds and endowments through JCF.

The Endowment Committee, comprised of Michael Goldstone, Cindy Levy, Ann Merkow, and Alan Meyers, will consult with the JCF. Soon you will hear more about the campaign. We'll plan to build our endowment, but the expertise and help of <u>all</u> members will be needed to make this vital effort happen.

Fortunately, we have mentors in our friends at Beth Hillel Temple in Kenosha, who have encouraged us to learn from their experience in building their very successful endowment and from their other fundraising efforts. But every member's time, funds and/or other valuable talents will be needed.

Sisterhood's Purim Crib project to collect items for agencies in need and again provided an overall plan. Working with the Religious School, Sandy involved the Confirmation Class and expanded the students' understanding of the community needs.

Sandy works each year with the Waukesha Women's Center and the Hope Center to ensure that products in need are collected. Over the years, the items donated have included toiletries, pajamas for children and underwear.

You should have seen the response when she delivered tons of underwear. The volunteers at the Hope Center opened their almost empty drawers of underwear. Many people have only one set of underwear, which they wear several times a week.

For the past few years, Sandy also has helped coordinate the social action projects run by the Midwest WRJ Leadership Conference held at OSRUI in the spring. One year the group collected books, and another it collected art supplies for children. In each case, Sandy found the donations a home and made the deliveries.

This year Sandy was deeply involved in developing and coordinating the Tikkun Olam of the WRJ Midwest District Biennial held in Milwaukee in October. Sandy worked with the district leadership to develop a program on human trafficking and a collection of items needed for victims of human trafficking. One seminar called "Making a Difference for Women in Peril" was devoted to creating backpacks with the collected items, and Sandy delivered the donations.

Sandy has been the driving force behind the our Sisterhood's successful social action program. She has inspired everyone in the CEEW Sisterhood and the entire synagogue to actively participate, and she is always finding new ways for us to perform a little more Tikkun Olam.

## Women learn, connect, do good work ... and sing

Nothing is more beautiful than attending a Women of Reform Judaism Shabbat service.

The Midwest District WRJ women really know how to sing. WRJ held its Midwest Convention in Milwaukee in October, and many from our congregation attended.

We all had the opportunity to attend a beautiful Friday night service at Shalom, and a Saturday morning "green" service at the Hyatt, in which a PowerPoint was used to project the service. The wonderful part about doing this is that the service could be customized and that the graphics behind the prayers were meaningful.

Convention participants had an opportunity to learn, network, perform Tikkun Olam and spiritually connect with Sisterhoods from seven states. Our Sisterhood is part of a larger organization — the Women of Reform Judaism, a division of the Union for Reform Judaism to which our synagogue belongs.

Our own **Sandy Villa** was in the center of the Tikkun Olam project as well as the panel discussion called "Making a Difference for Women in Peril."

Participants generously donated toiletries, socks and other goods that could be placed in backpacks donated by the CEEW Sisterhood. Fifty-seven backpacks were created during the convention and given to the Waukesha Women's Center (along with lots of extra toiletries) to be given to women in peril who come through the Women's Center.

Sandy also organized a panel discussion with the director of the Waukesha Women's Center and a police officer from the special unit dealing with human trafficking, aimed at educating women on human trafficking and clearing up the myths on who is susceptible to human trafficking. Young women from the low-income inner city are not the only targets.

There were many opportunities to study and learn about leadership. I was one of

the facilitators at a session introducing the "Chai Mitzvah" program, which provides a context for a group to study together using biblical text, commentary and questions to pepper the discussion.

Other sessions included learning about working together with people with different leadership styles, "Navigating the Second Half of Life with Meaning," "Leveraging Your Image for Attracting and Engaging Members," and more.

The convention also included a Shabbat dinner, a Youth, Education and Special Project brunch used to raise money for our future, a Kavod Awards luncheon and a Saturday night dinner followed by a Comedy Sportz entertainment program.

Of special mention is the Kavod Awards ceremony. In addition to Sandy Villa earning a Woman of Valor Award, our Sisterhood received two additional awards. It should be no surprise that under Sandy's leadership, we were first for our Social Action, Community Involvement with our Tikkun Olam Purim Crib Project where we collected PJs. # Still time for a 2018 tax deductible gift to CEEW

There are various ways you can donate to CEEW and have it be tax deductible.

- Pay your dues so that they are postmarked by Dec 31, 2018, if you wish them to be counted as a tax deduction for 2018.
- You can make a stock donation directly to CEEW, and there is no capital gains tax. If you would like to do a stock donation in 2018, you should start it as soon as possible. A stock donation has to happen through your broker and it takes time. Start now. If you wait until late December, the transfer from your broker may not happen by the end of the year.
- If you are 70½ or older, you can make a donation from an IRA. The donation is not taxable and counts toward your required minimum donation. Check with the company that is managing your plan for information on how to do it
- Of course, you can send us a check.

#### **BOOK CLUB REPORT / Mari-Claire Zimmerman Reviews: Outlander**

## Romance, time travel, danger, mystery

Outlander author **Diana Gabaldon** did not set out to write a fantastic novel, having a PhD in Environmental Ecology, and being a professor at Arizona State University.

She wanted to improve her ability to do research, and after watching a *Dr. Who* episode that involved a Scotsman from the 1700s, she decided to do research on the 1700s in Scotland. She learned about the strength of the Scottish

clans and their border skirmishes, and about Scotland's warring with the British.

She researched diseases and maladies and folk remedies available at that time. She researched their vernacular Gaelic, their superstitions and religious beliefs. Superstitions and folk tales also included stories of the "standing stones: circles, such as those at Stonehenge. She wrote about how a Scotsman would live in this sort of world, and named this character Jamie.
