As Cantor Martin announces her retirement date ...

Search committee to seek replacement for 'energetic, compassionate, well-prepared' spiritual leader

s you read in Cantor Martin's column on Page 2, our spiritual leader will be retiring at the conclusion of her contract on June 30th, 2020.

We have been blessed to have in **Deborah Martin** an energetic, compassionate and well-prepared professional for the past five years.

Debby came to us in the nick of time, so to speak. The timing of **Rabbi Adams's** departure to his new position made the timeline for hiring a new Rabbi nearly impossible. We had a template for how to go about the selection process from the Central Conference of American Rabbis (the professional organization for Reform Rabbis).

Unfortunately, new graduates from Hebrew Union College and the contract year for those already working was out of sync with our needs.

We had a few months to consider the qualities we wanted in a new Rabbi, and many of you participated in the process. Fortunately, Cantor Martin fit many of those qualities and was able to come to us right away, with almost no time to transition.

This time we have many factors working in our favor.

First, we have a competent spiritual leader to continue providing spiritual, educational and pastoral services for us while we undertake our search process. Cantor Martin has told us she will assist in the transition process.

Second, our community now has enough time to carefully consider the qualities and qualifications of her replacement. Our board must tell the CCAR by the first week of December 2019, that we are seeking a rabbi for our community (assuming we wish to

hire a rabbi).

The process will allow us to examine other issues as well. For instance, if we choose to have a rabbi rather than a cantor as spiritual leader, how will we meet our cantorial needs? As we explore these questions and others, we are also describing the kind of community we wish to be in the coming years. That information will be invaluable as we make decisions about programs, budgets, etc.

If we are to be able to communicate our clergy needs clearly, we must begin the process we completed last time (focus groups, etc.) soon. To that end, the board will be assembling a search committee that will include our personnel committee, some board members and congregants. Please let me know if you are interested in some aspect of the work, as there will be various tasks such as informationgathering, tabulation, interviewing, etc.

I am hopeful and ambitious about our future at CEEW. My attitude would be the same had Cantor Martin continued with us. But we — all of us as a community — will need to find a new spiritual guide to light our way.

I hope everyone, including our young ones, will partake in this sacred search.

All congregants invited to join students at Tu B'shevat Seder on Jan. 27th

anuary on the Jewish calendar is the month of shevat, which contains the holiday of Tu B'shevat, the 15th day of the month of shevat, or the celebration of the new year of the trees.

It is hard to think about planting trees or a harvest holiday in Wisconsin in January, but in Israel, it is the very beginning of the planting season and many people donate to the Jewish National Fund to plant trees in Israel.

Besides planting trees in Israel, one custom is to eat a new fruit on this day, or to eat from the Seven Species (shivat haminim) described in the Bible as being abundant in the land of Israel. Shivat Haminim are: wheat, barley, grapes (vines), figs, pomegranates, olives and dates (honey). (Deut. 8:8).

Reformjudaism.org states that in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, Tu B'shevat received renewed attention and importance. The kabbalists created a special ritual, modeled after the Passover seder, which celebrated God's presence in the natural world.

The Tu B'shevat seder, full of imagery and symbolism, is divided into four sections that represent the four seasons. As with the Passover seder, the Tu B'shevat seder evolved to include four cups of wine or grape juice, but in varying shades of red, which represent the seasons: white for the bleak time of winter, white with a bit of red to represent the earth's awakening in early spring, red with a bit of white representing the blossoming of late spring, and dark red to represent the fullness of all the growing plants and vegetation along with the heat of summer.

It is also custom to eat fruits of three types: fruits with tough outer shells and edible interiors (melons, peanuts, pome-

granates, coconuts, citrus, etc.), fruits with edible exteriors and inedible pits (dates, olives, plums, peaches, apples, etc.) and fruits that are entirely edible (berries, figs, grapes, etc.).



Sisterhood examines its history and thanks its founders

s 2019 begins, it's time to look back on the past 10 years of our Sisterhood's history: our hopes, commitments and accomplishments.

Our Sisterhood priorities of 2009 hold true as we begin 2019. The "checklist of priorities" expressed at our Feb. 4th, 2009, steering committee meeting could apply today.

In 2010, our Sisterhood founders listed the following priorities:

- To provide women in the congregation with a sense of identity and belonging;
- To provide worship and other spiritual opportunities for women;
- To promote Jewish living and strengthen Jewish family life;
- To serve the general Waukesha County community (Jefferson and Walworth counties included);
- To provide educational and intellectually stimulating programming for women;
- To provide opportunities for women to help others: g'milut chasidim (good deeds);
- To ensure the congregation is warm and welcoming;
- To provide programming for the congregation;
- To provide women with opportunities for Jewish study and learning.

The Sisterhood founders were well aware of women's issues in 2009, and emphasized those concerns by placing them first and foremost on their original list of priorities.

Founders recommended higher optional membership rates emphasizing the names of important Jewish women leaders. Therefore, Sisterhood founders adopted the following dues structure/ categories: Rachael \$36; Leah \$54; Rebecca \$108; and Sara \$180. It's important to note that Sisterhood membership dues are the same today as adopted in 2009-10, with the same recognition of women in leadership roles.

Programming in 2010-11 included

Jewish genealogy, Talmud and women's history. The Marge Eiseman program on Jewish culture was presented on June 5th, 2010.

Moving forward in 2019, Sisterhood anticipates expanding Jewish programming with a focus on new and innovative programs of interest to all congregants. We echo the same request as documented in our Feb. 2009 minutes stating: "We would welcome a program chair on our Board of Directors willing to submit ideas and arrange future Sisterhood programs." This position was filled in 2010, and we hope to fill the position in 2019.

Additional projects discussed and implemented in 2010 by our founders included applying to Women's Reform Judaism (WRJ and WRJ Midwest) our national and Midwest organizations. Additionally, founders adopted our CEEW Sisterhood bylaws, elected our first officers, implemented new fundraising ideas, and more.

This year, we recognize our energetic Sisterhood founders with admiration and thanks as we examine our progress and look to our future.

Sisterhood is moving forward in 2019 with progressive members who actively support our congregation and our Hebrew/Religious School.

Sisterhood donated almost \$16,000 in the past 10 years to our congregation and Hebrew/religious school. CEEW Sisterhood provided funding for *B'nai Mitzvah* and confirmation gifts, teacher recognition gifts and camp scholarships. Additionally, Sisterhood has contributed to prayer books, a CEEW computer and software, "Adopt a Bill," the Knox Box, new security doors, High Holiday security guards, facilities and more.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES NOTES

Dec. 13th Meeting

- Cantor Martin reported on a number of matters, including the success of the Nov. 14th Brookfield-Elm Grove Interfaith Network (BEGIN) service that attracted the participation of about 200 people and raised \$548 for the Waukesha Food Pantry. She also reported on the Nov. 16th Veterans Shabbat, the Nov. 30th New Members Shabbat, the Dec. 2nd Chanukah Fun Day.
- Cantor Martin is looking into the possibility of a class trip to New York City for the students who will be confirmed in June of 2019.
- Cantor Martin reported on her work, in collaboration with Laurie Schwartz and Carroll University Chaplain Rev. Elizabeth McCord, on the fundraising concert scheduled for April 14th.
- In the process of writing its three-year plan, the Board produced a preliminary prioritization of 18 action items. The four items with the highest priority were:
- 1. A commitment to establishing, before May 1st of 2019, a date by which CEEW will have in place as many of the components of a newly established endowment as possible.
- A commitment to reducing CEEW's debt to zero by staying on track to pay off our mortgage by early 2025 or sooner, and a commitment to keeping our debt at zero thereafter.
- 3. A commitment to continuing our long-standing commitment to participation in the Brookfield-Elm Grove Interfaith Network (BEGIN), and a commitment to expanding our interfaith efforts when and where appropriate.
- 4. A commitment to establishing a program for leadership development which takes advantage of the URJ's "Jew V' National Fellowship" project.
- Joe Dailey has resigned from his position as chair of the Facilities Committee, but he will continue as an active member of the committee.

Flu season is upon us, so stay healthy or stay home

It is flu season. The flu is of great risk to people 65 and older, young children and infants.

Older people are at greater risk of serious complications compared with young, healthy adults because immune system defenses become weaker with age. Many of our congregants are seniors, and several of our congregants are going through chemotherapy and other treatments that necessitate their staying away from folks with communicable diseases. Some people may have weakened immune systems.

The Center for U.S. Disease Control and Prevention has some tips that help organizations such as ours to do what we can to keep each other healthy:

 Do not come to Temple if you have a fever or are sneezing and/or coughing. You may not know if your disease is contagious or not, and you may still pass on your disease.

- Wash your hands with soap frequently.
- Do not prepare or set out food if you think you may be ill or may be becoming ill. Use anti-bacterial hand wipes, gels and creams.
- Consult with your healthcare specialist about flu shots or other precautions that are right for you to keep you healthy.
