

# ANTI-SEMITISM HITS HOME

# Endowment on agenda for annual meeting

Several of our students subjected to cruel remarks in high school, via social media and we respond

ver the past few years we have all seen a rise in anti-Semitism in America and around the world. It's been disturbing and painful to watch.

We faced the murders of 11 Jews in the synagogue of the Tree of Life Congregation in Pittsburgh on Saturday, Oct. 27<sup>th</sup> — the deadliest attack on Jews in American history. Then we saw the murder of one Jew and the wounding of three others at the Poway Chabad in suburban San Diego on Saturday, April 27<sup>th</sup>, just as the Jewish world prepared for *Yom HaShoah* (Holocaust

Remembrance Day).

I learned the week of April 28<sup>th</sup> that virulent anti-Semitism had reached our own community; the shared pain became even more poignant. Several of our students have been subjected to cruel anti-Semitic remarks.

I became aware of four incidents that impacted one family. Here's a summary.

- First, a boy approached a congregant who was in high school and asked him if he was Jewish, to which he replied, "Yes," and the boy said he hated him.
- Second, during the pledge of allegiance, a student told one
  of our middle school students that he hopes "Hitler comes
  back to kill the Jews." Our student did not know this bigot
  and didn't even think he would know she was Jewish.
- Third, when one of our middle school students was at a sleepover with a girlfriend, they were "face timing" with her girlfriend's boyfriend. During this face time session, her friend mentioned that our student was Jewish. Boys on the other end then started asking her, "Do you prefer gas or bullets? You should go die in a gas chamber. All heil Hitler! Bring back Hitler so he can kill all the Jews."
- Fourth, a boy in school pointed to one of our students and said in front of people, "Since I am German, and if I was a part of Hitler's army, I would shoot and kill her."

Another child in our congregation also experienced anti-Semitic abuse. He that he received an e-mail entitled "Brain" from a classmate. The email was highly offensive and anti-Semitic. The boy who sent this e-mail was called to the principal's office and, subsequently, wrote an apology saying that he "did not mean to insult" him and that he thought our congregant would find that picture "funny."

The same congregant also said he heard some kids telling Holocaust jokes, but not in front of him. Then one year later, one of the boys at his lunch table repeatedly told Holocaust jokes, even after he was told to cut it out and that he was being offensive. Things escalated a couple of months ago when this same boy started posting Holocaust comments and pictures on Instagram and Snapchat.

Similar social media posts are, unfortunately, rather common now, and we need to be aware of this. Our congregant's parent knew the family of that boy and contacted them directly before notifying the school. The parents were absolutely horrified and repeatedly said they didn't even know how to begin to apologize for their son's behavior. They had their son apologize personally. The family of that offender ended up talking about the Holocaust, their family's history and why these "jokes" are so offensive.

We must treat these incidents seriously. Thy include threats of violence. The Nazi party began with threatening words, and people didn't take them seriously until it was too late.

When observing Yom HaShoah, we say "never again." We must make sure we do everything in our power **never again** to see our people oppressed or harmed by anti-Semitism.

I have been in touch with the parents of these children, and with the Jewish Federation, and with the superintendent of these schools to discuss these incidents. I truly believe that we need to have better education to prevent similar episodes. I was heartened to learn that the superintendent also took that position. The superintendent expressed sorrow that any student would be subjected to such treatment, asked to meet and assured me and others that "disparaging remarks about any population are not acceptable behavior."

The Holocaust needs to be taught so that we never again hear that the Holocaust didn't happened. We also need these kids to realize the gruesome reality of how many families and children were murdered just because they were Jewish. We also need to discuss bullying and how it is not OK to treat others differently because of their religion, color, race or sexual identity. My experience with Waukesha County interfaith groups has informed me about far too many terrible incidents against Muslim and black students. We need to expand our rebellion against bigotry to include all of its victims.

We need to discuss how posting hatred and bigotry on Facebook is dangerous and can ultimately contribute to shootings in schools, synagogues, mosques and churches. Our response is important to our children and, in the long run, to the world. I suspect that some of the offenders thought they were just being funny, but when hateful, bigoted talk circulates, it only takes one disturbed child who uses a gun after learning to hate. Unfortunately, we have seen too much of that.

Hitler began with words. Words can be powerful and dangerous. When we see adults posting hateful vitriol on social media, we could give our children terrible messages if we imply that such behavior is in any way acceptable.

**Rabbi Laurie Zimmerman**, from Congregation Shaarei Shamayim, a Reconstructionist congregation in Madison, spoke to the community of Baraboo after the posting of high

school boys doing a heil Hitler salute. She stressed the importance of education and understanding. She stressed her concern over white supremacy and its ugly ideology that can affect all of us.

She said, "We are at a crossroads in this country. Either we will become a country that honors and welcomes everyone in all their diversity, as we try to learn from each other and appreciate our differences, or we will become a country that even more staunchly privileges white, Christian people over everyone else, a country that even more firmly institutionalizes racism and, in doing so, disparages Jews, along with African-Americans, Latinos, Muslims, Native Americans, Asian-Americans, and lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people."

Hate crimes with racial or ethnic bias have jumped, according to the FBI. Hate groups are growing. In its annual <u>Audit of Anti-Semitic Incidents</u>, the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) found that the number of anti-Semitic incidents in the U.S. rose 57 percent in 2017 — the largest single-year increase on record and the second highest reported since ADL started tracking such data in 1979.

The sharp rise was in part due to a significant increase in incidents in schools and on college campuses; they nearly doubled for the second year in a row. Anti-Semitic assaults in the United States more than doubled in 2018 and anti-Semitic incidents overall remain near all-time highs, according to a new report by the Anti-Defamation League.

Ben Kesslen, in a US News article, states, "We unfortunately saw this trend continue into 2019 with the tragic shooting at the Chabad synagogue in Poway."

In the report "Anti-Semitic Incidents Remained at Near-Historic Levels in 2018; Assaults Against Jews More Than Doubled," the ADL stated this about incidents reported in 2018:

 "Assaults: 39 incidents, marking an increase of 105 percent from the 19 incidents reported in 2017. Those incidents affected 59 victims, up from 21 in 2017, and include the 11 fatalities and

two injured congregants in Pittsburgh.

- 'Harassment: 1,066 incidents of anti-Semitic harassment were reported to ADL last year, a 5 percent increase from 1,015 in 2017, and a 48 percent increase from 721 in 2016.
- "Vandalism: 774 incidents of anti-Semitic vandalism were recorded in 2018, down 19 percent from 952 in 2017, but up 52 percent from 510 in 2016."

That report went on to say, "While most anti-Semitic incidents are not directly perpetrated by extremists, there are interesting connections between the trends. In 2018, 249 acts of anti-Semitism (13 percent of the total incidents) were attributable to known extremist groups or individuals inspired by extremist ideology, making it the highest level of anti-Semitic incidents with known connections to extremists or extremist groups since 2004."

In her speech to the Baraboo community, Rabbi Zimmerman stressed a Jewish way of moving forward from this disturbing trend.

She said, "In Judaism, when one person hurts another person — regardless of whether the act was intentional — that person is required to do what is called

teshuvah. It is a process of real reconciliation. This concept of teshuvah carries with it the recognition that we all make mistakes. We all do things we wish we hadn't done.

"A necessary component of *teshuvah* is learning. In this situation the learning needs to include the history of the Holocaust, but I would also argue that we should examine the experiences of other historically oppressed peoples. So let's also learn about Native Americans who were massacred, or driven off their lands here in Wisconsin, and the history of African-Americans who were forced into slavery so others could profit. We must help our young people develop critical thinking skills, broaden their perspectives, and become engaged in their world."

Teshuvah is a word we hear quite often in our High Holiday services. It recognizes that we have a responsibility to work together with one another to heal the strife in our relationships and in the world. We must work together for tikkun olam, the repair of the world. This is our responsibility as people of all faiths and our covenant with God.

Kein Yehi Ratzon. May this be God's will.

### **ANALYSIS:** Don't get false impression about budget

The 2019-20 budget makes it look at first glance as if we face a large deficit for that year, but that impression is false.

We can relax about that specific matter. Here's why:

The Finance Committee and the Board of Trustees have chosen to hold all unspent portions of the income from The Board knows it intends to make the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary fundraising concert on April 14th at Carroll University in a reserve fund.

affect us beyond the coming fiscal year. as we vote on activating our endowment.

Of course, the next step will be to begin planning how to make the endowment viable so that it does what we expect of it: relieve pressure on our annual budget so we can provide excellent programs, highly professional staff and a wellmaintained facility while enjoying fiscal stability.

Theodore Herzl, in his 19<sup>th</sup>-century quest to establish a homeland for the Jewish people, declared, "If you will it, it is no dream." Four years of work on behalf of a dedicated committee, several iterations of committed Temple boards, and one stubborn president have borne us to this point. The next step is to plan a campaign to fill the coffers of the endow-

Who will help us "will this dream" into reality? We are all needed for this en-

deavor. Donors are needed of course. But plans for a campaign need to be devised that don't presume one has deep pockets. In short, every Temple member is needed to help with this project, whether it's a one-time task or a longer-term one.

The payoff for this work is that our fiscal well-being will be assured, which is good for ALL members.

I want to thank the Endowment Committee members who worked so diligently and persistently on the foundations of our endowment: Dr. Michael Goldstone, Cynthia Levy, Dr. Ann Merkow and our treasurer, Alan Meyers. The late David Rubenstein participated in the committee at the beginning of the committee's work.

They interviewed several financial advisors and management institutions before recommending the Milwaukee Jewish Community Foundation as the vehicle for our endowment.

The next committee will be tasked with designing a campaign to raise money for the foundation.

Sources of funds will be sought both inside our own ranks and from other sources such as foundations, friends of CEEW and others who wish us well.

Our fundraising chair, Laurie Schwartz, who spearheaded the very successful Jewish Music Concert this spring, will no doubt have ideas, too.

Everyone will be needed in this effort, which will be of benefit to everyone.

I hope you will answer the call.

# Madie juggles busy young life with maturity, grace and a big heart

adie Baumann makes it look easy.
Jennifer Baumann knows differently.

Madie, who will become Bat Mitzvah along with her friend **Avery Kukuk** in a combined ceremony July 20<sup>th</sup>, has been called to the bima occasionally to chant during a Shabbat service. And Madie has confidently done a good job.

But she has had to overcome adversity.

"These past two years, while preparing for the B'Not Mitzvah, Madie has been required to juggle a lot of responsibilities between school, learning Hebrew, the Mitzvah project and playing a select sport," said Jennifer, her mother. "Along the way she has faced obstacles, between suffering a significant sports injury to facing anti-Semitism. She not only had the strength to face these obstacles, but handled and overcame these obstacles with maturity and grace, and then proceeded to excel in these responsibilities."

Madie, 14, who will be a freshman at Kettle Moraine High School in the fall, likes being one of the only Jewish children in her group of friends.

"You do not hear many kids talk about what they received for Hanukkah, or that they celebrate different holidays," Madie said. "Celebrating

Jewish holidays makes me different from people and that is one thing I like about being Jewish. I like being different from others. I am proud to be Jewish."

Even if that means being subjected to anti-Semitism.

"Preparing for my Bat Mitzvah and studying Hebrew has taken on more meaning and significance in light of the rise in anti-Semitism," she said. "This has impacted me because since I am a Jewish person, I find it extremely appalling that people would be saying hateful comments toward me, or my religion. Comments that have been directed at me have made me reconsider who I should and shouldn't trust. This has also made me more aware of how people should be treated, and work toward stopping hate."



# Board purchases trees for Israel to honor cantors

The Temple Board of Trustees purchased trees to be planted in Israel in honor of the cantors who participated in our 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary concert April 14<sup>th</sup> as a thank you for their stellar efforts on behalf of CEEW.

### **BOARD OF TRUSTEES NOTES**

May 13<sup>th</sup> Meeting By JOE DAILEY

- DUES: The Board had not raised dues at all for the 2018-19 year. The Board did approve an increase that would equal approximately a match to the nation's cost-of-living increase since June of 2018.
- BUDGET: The Board passed unanimously the 2019-20 budget as presented by the Finance Committee and modified by the Board in discussions during the meeting.
- CONCERT UPDATE: Thanks especially to the dedication and hard work of Cantor Martin and Fundraising Committee Chair Laurie Schwartz, the April 14<sup>th</sup> concert earned approximately \$38,000. The Finance Committee could not be precise to the last dollar because it is possible that relatively small bills might still come in.
- MORTGAGE: The Board approved paying \$15,000 in May to paying down our mortgage (which is technically a business loan). At the time of the meeting we owed approximately \$96,000, Our mortgage term will be up soon, and the Board anticipates a new agreement with Waukesha State Bank, one that will see our mortgage paid off in approximately 2029.
- TEMPLE PRESIDENCY: As of the time of the May Board meeting, the Nominating Committee had no candidate to present for the CEEW presidency.
- **BYLAWS**: The board passed an amendment to CEEW's bylaws, one that would allow co-presidents. The amendment will be presented for approval at the annual meeting. Specifically, the amendment says: "The Nominating Committee may nominate two people to serve as co-presidents. Nomination of copresidents shall not be allowed from the floor during membership meetings. The co-presidents shall be counted as one person under these bylaws, and each of them, acting without the other, shall have the power and authority to exercise the duties and responsibilities of the president. Co-presidents should communicate with each other, but any dispute between them shall be decided by the immediate past president. Following the expiration of their term, only one of them shall serve as the immediate past president, as selected by them or determined by coin toss."
- NEW OVEN UNIT: The new two-oven unit that replaces the one lost to a fire cost about \$3,000, and the congregation is seeking donations to help cover the cost.
- **CONVERSION UPDATE:** Cantor Martin reported that we may have a new conversion student in addition to the two or three students who could finish their conversion preparation within a month or two.



2019-20 CALENDAR TO BE SET: The 2019-20 CEEW calendar will be set during a meeting Wednesday, June 19th, from noon to 2 p.m. Groups that schedule events are encouraged to have a representative attend the meeting.
