Make habit of making changes

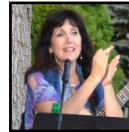
As I write this article, I am busy preparing for the High Holidays. On Sunday night, you will celebrate Rosh Hashanah — *Shanah Tovah* — Happy New Year!

We are now in the intermediate days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur; they're called *Yamim Noraim* — the 10 Days of Awe. During the month of Elul, the month before Rosh Hashanah, and during Selichot, the Saturday evening before Rosh Hashanah, we prepare for these 10 days. Now we are in the middle of them.

Why so much preparation for and time to observe these 10 days? In my opinion, it's all about change. We are changing the Hebrew calendar year from 5779 to 5780. We are starting to change seasons and temperatures as we go from summer into fall. We are changing our fun in the sun time to back to work and back to school. We are changing ourselves away from our past sins to lives of holiness; we are changing our behavior so we will do better in the coming year.

These are a lot of changes, and, as any psychologist will tell you, change is hard to navigate. We are creatures of habit, and it doesn't feel good to change our habits, even if we know the changes are good for us.

We hate going on diets and changing the way we eat, changing from greasy, sugary, fatty foods, to wholesome fruits and veggies.

We might hate working out or going for walks or bike rides, when sitting in front of the TV is so much more relaxing! Believe me, I get it.

Most people who make these changes feel so much better when they do. I know from my own experience. When I take my protein shake and vitamins and eat a healthy diet of veggies, fruits and protein, I have much more energy and feel so much better. When I take the weight off, I also feel so much better. However, those other foods are SO tempting.

During the High Holidays, we try to change the habits

that tarnish our souls and make us feel bad about ourselves. When we hurt other people's feelings, even if we don't want to admit it, we are also hurting ourselves. We are seeing something in ourselves that we don't like to see. Most of us say things we regret in the heat of anger or frustration. Sometimes it is hard to control those strong emotions.

Moses was a prime example of intense anger. He became angry and lost control after seeing an Egyptian taskmaster beating an Israelite slave. Moses was angry while throwing the Ten Commandments and shattering

them, and also when he saw the Israelites worshipping the golden calf, and also when he was hitting the stone to bring forth water instead of pointing to it, as God had commanded him.

If one of our most righteous and beloved prophets and leaders of the Jewish faith could have these faults, then no wonder we also slip into them.

The Bible even shows God being angry with us before Moses calms God down and reasons with him. Perhaps the Torah is making a point by showing us that we all have faults and fall into anger at times, anger that might be warranted but could certainly be handled in a calmer way.

Yom Kippur gives us the opportunity to learn just that. We NEED these 10 days to really think about what we have done in the past. We need to think about the things we are ashamed of, admit them and try to resolve them better in the future. We need to make a habit of making those changes.

Change is a slow process, and you have to really want to change in order to do it.

In hearing the shofar blast, we awaken our spirits to face ourselves and to face God and to look into our souls to ask for awareness and forgiveness for our weaknesses and sins.

May the shofar blast help us to become our better selves in the coming new year of 5780.

- Her vision on how to improve gender diversity and female leadership in the law profession.

Dallet, elected in April of 2018, is the sixth female justice to serve on the court, the highest percentage of female justices in the nation.

Dallet previously served as president of the Milwaukee Trial Judges Association and secretary of the Association of Women Lawyers. Dallet also served one year as the first female presiding court commissioner in Milwaukee County, a state prosecutor and a circuit court judge.

Dallet, who is Jewish, is married with three children.

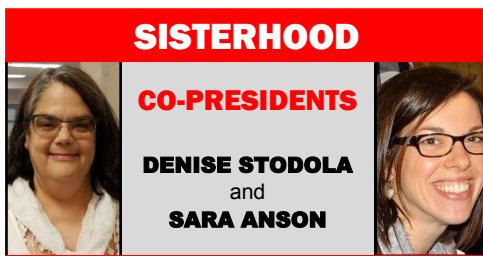

Blowing the shofar at CEEW for nearly 30 years, Mark Levy has become our

Mark Levy first sounded shofar blasts for Congregation Emanu-El of Waukesha in the original sanctuary in 1990, or thereabouts. While the sanctuary was replaced after remodeling, we have kept our shofar instrumentalist ever since.

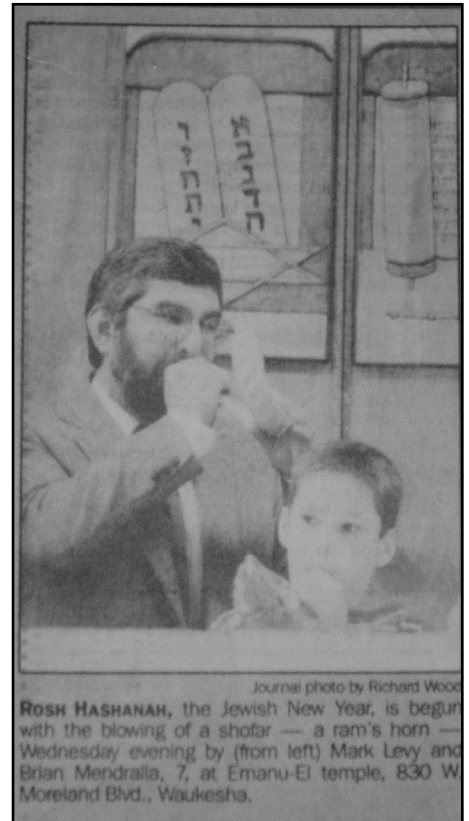
On Sept. 16, 1993, the *Milwaukee Journal* illustrated a story about our congregation with a photo of Mark and 7-year-old **Brian Mendralla**, each blowing a shofar.

It was while traveling in Israel that Mark found and purchased the shofar he now uses. Customers were allowed to sound the ones for sale, and Mark picked his because of its tone and because the mouthpiece end was wide and therefore comfortable.

Tradition has it that the sounds of the shofar are prescribed with almost no room at all for improvising. Options for improvisation are limited to a short lead-in tone, and a short finishing tone, Mark said.

The learning begins on Sundays, midweek

I am excited to report that the start of the 2019-20 school year has been great so far.

As I write this article, I am teaching our kindergarten through second-grade class. The students are learning the aleph bet through *Let's Discover the Aleph Bet* packets that include: a key Hebrew word — with an accompanying English explanation — to teach the new letter, inventive activities to reinforce the shape and sound of each letter, additional Hebrew vocabulary words beginning with the new letter and playful exercises to engage the child's artistic and creative interests.

The students also are going to be using the Teach Me Torah series that will introduce 16 classic Bible texts, from Genesis to the Book of Esther, and the Jewish values that can be drawn from them, such as taking care of God's world and asking for forgiveness. These students are also being introduced to the Jewish holidays.

We have a new third / fourth-grade Religious School teacher, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee senior **Sarah Berry**. She is originally from Madison, and was one of Cantor Martin's Bat Mitzvah students.

Our third- and fourth-graders are learning how to build their Jewish Identity.

In the first part of the year, the students will focus on the key concept of the Jewish community. Through stories, interviews and activities, the students will discover how our community brings us together, providing a life-long connection to our heritage, culture and values.

The second half of the year, the students will be focusing on living according to Jewish time — the Jewish calendar, Shabbat and the cycle of holidays, and lifecycle events. Our students will develop an understanding of how time is an important and sacred part of Jewish life.

Marie Loeffler has returned this year as our 5th, 6th and 7th-grade teacher.

Marie is teaching The Living Jewish Values series that introduces students to the most important — and sustaining — values of our tradition using a workbook / journal format that invites student reflection.

The first half of the year, the students will be focusing on how to be a good friend, learning how gossip is dangerous and peer pressure. They will learn through the following values: Judging Favorably (*Dan L'chaf Zechut*), Friendship (*Reyut*), The Power of Speech (*Koach Hadibur*) and Courage (*Ometz*

Lev).

The second half of the year, the students will be focusing on how to contribute to the kehillah, the difference between seeking justice and getting what you want and how to show *arevut* to international Jewish communities and *Tikkun Olam*: What can I do?

They will learn through the following values: Community (*Kehillah*), Justice (*Tzedek*), Mutual Responsibility (*Arevut*), and Repairing the World

We are excited to welcome **Zack Jauquet** back to religious school as a *madrich* (an assistant) in our 5th through 7th-grade class, and **Briar Rahmes** is a *madricha* in our 3rd- and 4th-grade class. Briar also will help with administrative tasks.

MIDWEEK HEBREW

Our Midweek Hebrew program has expanded.

We are continuing our *aleph* class for our 3rd-graders, using the *Shalom Uvrachah Primer Print Edition*, which not only teaches the students the letters and vowels of the Hebrew alphabet but also teaches decoding skills and how to write the letters in print.

We have started a new *bet* class for our students who were in *aleph* last year and are ready to learn prayers. These students are using *Hineni* prayer packets in order to learn to read fluently from the siddur, translate key words from the prayers, understand the themes of the prayers, place the prayers in the sequence of the service and actively participate in synagogue services as they advance through the year and into *gimmel*.

We have created a *gimmel* class for our students who were in *bet* class last year and are continuing to learn to sing and pray in Hebrew, as well as read, explore and interpret prayer text and begin preparing for their bar / bat

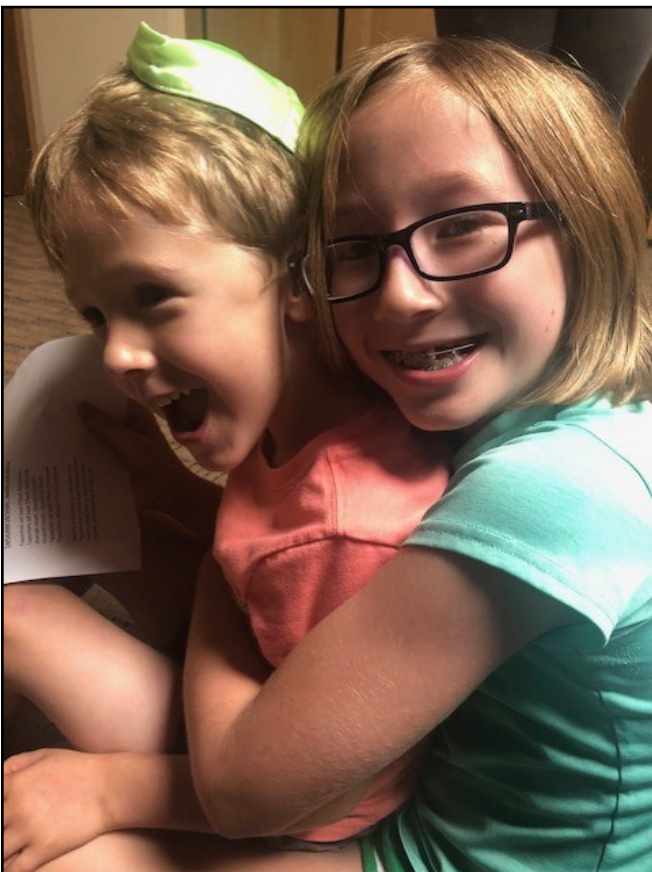

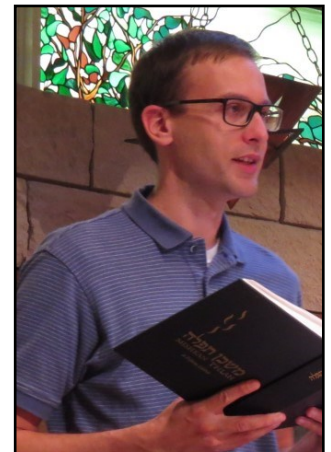
BOARD OF TRUSTEES NOTES

September 10th Meeting

- The Board approved **Bernie Sandler** to serve as a board member at-large, replacing **Laurie Schwartz**, who left that post to serve as one of our co-presidents. Bernie also agreed to take on the job of chair of the Facility Committee.
- The Board passed a motion to look for someone to work 10 hours a week as our administrator. That person would not have to be a CEEW member, nor would the person have to be Jewish. (*Please see page 6.*)
- The Board thanked **Sisterhood** for its pledge of financial support for security for the High Holidays.
- The Board discussed briefly the possibility of a special membership for individuals and families that would benefit from maintaining connections with two congregations.
- Co-President **Laurie Schwartz** discussed her on-going conversations with our insurance company about coverage for our Torah scrolls. We are likely to estimate the values of each of our Torah scrolls and list each item individually with the insurance company so as to ensure proper coverage.
- The price of a plaque on our memorial board was, at the time of the meeting, \$250. A motion to raise that price to \$300 as of Nov. 1st of this year passed unanimously. Related discussion confirmed that it is possible for a person to pre-order a memorial plaque.
- Vice President **Mark Levy** reported on the URJ's Biennial 2019, which is scheduled to run from 8 a.m. on Dec. 11th until 1 p.m. on Dec. 15th. At the time of the meeting, CEEW had seven people intending to attend; we thus qualified as a platinum delegation. URJ will be accepting reservations, and the "early bird" rate of \$875 for everything except hotel and travel expenses should be available at least until Oct. 7th. Mark hopes that one or two buses will be making one-day attendance possible for about \$100.
- Treasurer **Alan Meyers** said CEEW had been operating with two credit cards, one assigned to President **Ann Meyers** and the other assigned to the congregation's administrator, **Marcy Hotz**. After his recommendation to make a change, the Board approved unanimously a motion to phase out the card assigned to Ann and replace it with a card assigned to the treasurer.
- A motion to renew our service contract on our automatic electronic defibrillator (AED) passed unanimously.



CEEW welcomes all who want full membership: Dues relief possible

We, as a community, need to remind ourselves that we welcome all Reform Jews, as well as their non-Jewish spouses, to full CEEW membership, no matter what the circumstances.

Co-President **Ann Meyers** expressed that opinion in a recent interview.

"We have always wanted full membership to belong to those who want it, without regard to ability to pay. And we want full membership to be as easy as possible for everyone," she said.

She anticipates having two new, sensitive and discreet committee members. They would serve on the Mensch Committee along with a long-time committee member, Treasurer **Alan Meyers**, her husband.

Ann sometimes worries that people might wrongly conclude that she and Alan must inevitably mention some

things about specific congregants and the Mensch Committee in their conversations, she explained. That's not the case. "We have set up absolute barriers to any such conversations," she said. "They never happen."

"Both Alan and I find it extremely important that conversations within the Mensch Committee are absolutely privileged. What happens in the Mensch Committee stays in the Mensch Com-

mittee. That's absolutely essential," she said. Nobody outside of the committee should know about its work with individual congregation members.

In his June 18th letter to all members, Alan expressed the same ideas when he wrote, "... **we do not turn aside anyone because of finances, and all discussions are kept confidential.**"

Of course our members, like most of our fellow citizens everywhere, have to watch their budgets closely.

Question: If the articulated price tag for CEEW membership doesn't mesh with a member's budget, what should the member do?

Answer: Simply write a letter to, or send an email to Treasurer **Alan Meyers** and state what you think your dues ought to be. That will get the ball rolling. Ideally, the next steps will be easy and quick for the person asking for dues relief.
