As Debbie Friedman sang: We must live for today, we must build for tomorrow.

Jews keep faith strong in modern world

just read a lovely article by Hank Bordowitz about Debbie Friedman, the singer-songwriter who changed Jewish music with her inherent instincts of knowing how to appeal to the modern Jew without giving up Hebrew or any important traditions.

As a camp song leader at Olin-Sang-Ruby Union Institute (OSRUI) in Oconomowoc in the early 1970s, she linked Hebrew and English to familiar folk melodies to express Jewish prayer so people could sing along and understand.


The guitar allowed her to take her music to different locations at camp, and to welcome everyone, especially those who would sing along with her. Her *Mi Shebeirach* prayer for healing has been sung world-wide by Jews and gentiles.

Bordowitz's article made me think about how adaptive Jews have been for thousands of years and why we have survived exile, oppression and anti-Semitism through unbelievable obstacles, while other religions and nations have not.

I've often marveled at this and wondered what made it possible. I believe it was a combination of adaptation, memory and the importance of handing down the traditions and beliefs to the next generations.

In the Babylonian exile after the Temple's destruction, Jews began meeting to read Torah and pray together. The teachers and prophets of the time would not allow





Debbie Friedman's yahrzeit was being observed when Cantor Martin wrote this column. Friedman died at age 59 on Jan. 9, 2011. "Twentyfive years ago, North American Jews had forgotten how to sing," said Rabbi Eric Yoffie, former president of the Union for Reform Judaism. "Debbie reminded us how to sing, she taught us how to sing. She gave us the vehicles that enabled us to sing. Then she impacted our youth and our camps and, ultimately, from there she impacted our synagogues. What happens in the synagogues of Reform Judaism today — the voices of song are in large measure due to the insight, brilliance and influence of Debbie Friedman."

Jews to forget their faith. They substituted prayer for sacrifices. Martyrs who died with the *Shma* on their lips had made sure that they had students who would carry on the faith.

Wherever they have lived, Jews have adapted and absorbed customs, languages and music. Unfortunately, when they stopped using Hebrew as their vernacular, many started gradually to forget their original language.

In response, sages and scholars developed a special system of vowels, punctuations and even the cantillations so that the Jews would not forget how to speak the language or sing the melodies. Yet there were slight differences, depending on where people lived.

Debbie Friedman sought to preserve Hebrew prayer while invigorating it with a newly absorbed language, English, and her own take on modern American music.

She inherited her passion for Judaism from her *bubbe* (grandmother), and she made her own passion accessible to other Jews so they could pray in a melodic and easy framework that was to become their own.

I was not allowed to chant Torah for my Bat Mitzvah or put on a tallit or Kippah. I understand the importance of my being counted in a minyan. Debbie Friedman created music on behalf of all modern Jews, and especially women. When she touched you, she touched you deeply.

Although she was selftrained musically and scholastically, she studied the texts and music with scholars and cantors. She wrote music to convey the meaning of traditional prayers, often with words in both Hebrew and English. In doing so, she spoke to the mind and heart.

She once taught the V'ahavta prayer, sung to her music, with much in English translation. "I was stunned when they suddenly put their arms around each other and there were tears rolling down their faces," she said. "They were reclaiming this prayer, and it was ours in a musical language they were able to understand ... We were reclaiming something that we hadn't touched, that we had no access to until now."

We Jews continue to adapt. Jews are acquiring new ways to find meaning and beauty in our traditions and texts. Some of us do so by merging the music of our time and place with the traditions and words of the past.

May we continue to learn as we grow spiritually. May we always continue to adapt, to remember our past and to dream as we create our future.

May we also continue to teach our children to love, cherish and teach the new generations as they make Judaism meaningful in their lives.

Kein Yehi Ratzon! May this be God's will!

• Large baby bottles


Hope Center is well stocked on diapers, wipes and small bottles. Please refrain from including these items, as storage space is at a minimum.

Mrs. Everything, a book written by Jennifer Weiner, is the story of a Jewish family in Detroit.




It tells about the two sisters and their lives and childhood in the 1950s until the epilogue set in 2022. This novel covers

BOARD OF TRUSTEES NOTES January 13th Meeting **By JOE DAILEY / Bulletin Co-Editor**

Board addresses security issues; We're doing OK financially

- The Board passed a motion to pay for security for any B'nai Mitzvah service within our building during this fiscal year.
- The Board passed a motion saying that the Facility Committee should install approximately 12 new LED lighting fixtures.
- The Board passed a motion to cover, up to \$100 each, the cost of CPR and automatic external defribrillator (AED) training for Cantor Martin and for Education Director Carrie Barbakoff.
- CEEW has received a \$10,000 grant from the Milwaukee Jewish Federation to underwrite our security quards during the year 2020. We do not know who contributed the grant money to the Federation. We do not know whether the grant will be renewed next year.
- Treasurer Alan Meyers reported that CEEW is doing better financially than our original budget for this year anticipated. He anticipates that the congregation will end the fiscal year with a deficit, but that deficit will be smaller than anticipated. He reminded the Board that his estimates have tended to be pessimistic.
