Repairing the world is important to January's CEEW Volunteer of the Month.

"We live busy lives, and it is easy to let our lives become so central that we lose sight of the need to make a difference in the lives of other people," Phil said.

Phil has been principal of our Religious School since 2001. He has no title for his volunteer work, but when things need to get done, Phil is often there.

Organizing Volunteer Day, in which congregants, teachers, students and aides help out in the community, and promoting the collection of food for the Waukesha Food Pantry are his most satisfying undertakings.

"Both are about making a difference in the larger community, and I believe strongly that the synagogue should have a presence in the community," Phil said.

Phil lives in Milwaukee, so it's a schlep to come to Waukesha during the week to trim the bushes, rake the leaves and do what he can to keep everything looking nice.

- helping with the grounds

- donating things for synagogue, such as the mat at the bottom of the short flight of stairs, brooms and a dust pan, and (with Marcy Hotz) buying the new shelving unit in the paper goods closet
- making sure the sanctuary is cleaned up after events
- helping with synagogue security
- helping with Adult Education
- being a lay leader for services

Why do it? "The synagogue as a community supports me — both spiritually and financially — so giving back to see that it remains not only strong, but also clean, is important to me," Phil said.

He encourages others to donate food, help around the mobile homes, donate winter clothes and toys at Chanukah and baby items at Purim.

"These acts are the highest expression of Jewish values," Phil said. "People can get a sense that to be fully Jewish means giving as much as possible to make the world a better place."

# Keeping our minds and hearts open to the needs of others



s I write this January column, it is not even Chanukah yet. This season of light, which comes at the depths of darkness, challenges us to bring light to the world. Not just by lighting candles or decorating or homes with strings of light, but more importantly by making a positive difference in the world. Gemilut hasadim (acts of love and kindness) and tikun olam (repairing the world) are central Jewish values. Jewish sages emphasize that it is not enough to pray, nor is it enough to focus on social justice. One must do both.

When I see the students bring items for the food bin each Sunday, I know the message is being understood. When I look into the bin, when I put my own donations in the bin and see that the bin is starting to fill up, then I know the membership is taking the message to heart. I feel the same way when I saw the contributions to our recent Winter Clothes and Toy Drive.

The bitter cold that just passed should be a reminder to us that there are many without warm coats, hats, mittens or boots. We cannot end all poverty or misfortune, but we can help ameliorate the worst effects for some people.

The hardest part of helping is remembering to help. We get so caught up in our own lives, we forget to bring food when we come to the synagogue. That is not surprising, nor is it shameful. It is natural. We need to care for our own families, friends and neighbors and we

have our challenges and health to pay attention to. Still, I try to remind the

school community and the larger synagogue membership to keep the food bin "as a frontlet before your eyes," so that through the hurly-burly of our lives, we will keep at least a little of our minds and hearts open to the needs of others.

There are two events in the January school calendar to highlight. First, synagogue member and school parent **Andi Patz** is going to lead students in, what she calls, the Jewish Identity Mask Project. Over two class periods (Jan. 8<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup>) the students will make masks that symbolize their Jewish identity and then the students will make short presentations on the meaning of their masks on Friday night, Jan. 20<sup>th</sup>. On Jan. 27<sup>th</sup>, the 6<sup>th</sup>/7<sup>th</sup> grade class will participate in the Friday night service. Please join the students and don't forget to bring an item for the food bin.

Finally, representatives from Camp Interlaken (Jan. 22<sup>nd</sup>) and OSRUI (Jan. 29<sup>th</sup>) will come to the synagogue to makes presentations to the students and parents. Jewish camping experiences have been shown to have a powerful influence on future Jewish identity. While Jewish camping experiences can be expensive, both camps have endowments to lessen the cost, our own synagogue and Sisterhood have money available to help ease the cost, and families can also make contact with OneHappyCamper. Send your child to camp, and your child will have a positive Jewish experience.



## TREASURES TO BE FOUND IN 2017



As this issue of *Kol Emanu-El* arrives, 2016 is about to wink out. 2017 will soon burst on the scene with fireworks, confetti and energetic celebration. The ancient Romans portrayed January as the dual-headed god Janus, with one head looking back and the other forward. As Jews, we've "been there, done that" during the *Yamim Nora'im*, during the Days of Awe in the fall; but it's never a waste to spend time to reflect and then to confirm, reject or redirect our actions going forward.

The paragraph by Nobel laureate Par Lagerkvist (in the box at right) is one of my favorites since I first read it as a teen. I immediately linked the last sentence to my love of shelling on the beaches of Sanibel Island, Florida. There I'd lose myself for hours on winter break, hunting for just the right shells for my collection. My favorite shell was no longer than one inch, white and shaped like a squiggle of whipped cream. As if that weren't enough to make them elusive, the shell was classified as "uncommon" by experts. Nonetheless, a morning spent looking for wentletraps was enough to chase away a semester worth of stress. For that reason, finding even two or three was a triumph.

Although I don't go shelling anymore, there are still treasure-pebbles to be found if I take even a moment to look and listen. Beauty in

nature and acts of kindness aren't that hard to find. But the pebbles may take a lot of polishing for me when it's not imme-

diately evident there's beauty to be discovered.

Someone whose personality or appearance is different from the typical; culture or language that's unfamiliar; or values that vary from my own may take some patience and elbow grease before I can appreciate what's worth treasuring.

"...But he is obviously fascinated by everything. I have seen him pick up a stone from the ground and examine it with the deepest interest, turn it and twist it, and finally pocket it, as though it were a rarity. And everything seems to fascinate him. Is he a lunatic? An enviable lunatic! One for whom a pebble has value must be surrounded by treasures wherever he goes."

worth it. I've met a lot of interesting people I might not have otherwise; tried some interesting foods (some I may never try again, to be honest.); and seen value in opinions very different from my own.

I'll keep making time to look for more treasures in 2017. I hope the new secular year brings you and your dear ones good health and much to treasure.

# Opera About Biblical Nebuchadnezzar: Jan. 11<sup>th</sup> CEEW Meetup Group By Jeff Shabman

Nabucco, the third opera and first major success of Giuseppe Verdi (1813 – 1901), will be performed at the New York City's Metropolitan Opera and streamed live via satellite to movie theatres worldwide on Wednesday, Jan. 11<sup>th</sup>.

You are invited to join with the CEEW Meetup Group at 5:45 p.m. for a pre-performance talk and at 6:30 p.m. for the opera, both at the Marcus Majestic movie theatre in

Brookfield. There you'll enjoy this telling of the story of the Hebrew people under the treacherous dynasty of King Nebuchadnezzar in ancient Iraq.

The opera story is an adaptation from the Bible, and the music is glorious. Among the hits from this opera is the choral work that became Italy's unofficial national anthem, "Va pensiero."

The legendary Plácido Domingo will bring another new baritone role to the Met under the baton of his longtime collaborator, Music Director

Emeritus, James Levine. Soprano Liudmyla Monastyrska will portray Abigaille, the warrior woman determined to rule empires. Mezzo-soprano, Jamie Barton, will be the heroic Fenena, Nabucco's daughter. Bass, Dmitri Belosselskiy, will provide the stentorian voice of Zaccharia, the high priest of the oppressed Hebrew people and Tenor, Russell Thomas, will portray Ismaele.

I will have a pre-curtain talk about Verdi's life and times as he prepared to create this masterwork, and I will make handout copies of the story available when we meet. I have a degree in music history.

### **CEEW Performs a Mitzvah with Books**

While planning for the recent Volunteer/Closet Clean-up Day, we realized that the Temple had many siddurim, hagadot, and other prayer books that we haven't used in years. It is Jewish tradition to bury sacred books and objects in a respectful way, and to this end we were looking into burying them ritually in a cemetery.

Mark Levy had a better idea: he posted a notice on a Jewish electronic bulletin board, "The Tent," asking if anyone needed such books. He got a response: a rabbi in Kokomo, Indiana, takes religious books to penal institutions – jails and prisons – within the state. Mark inquired about how many he could use. The rabbi's response was "as many as you can send; we will pay the shipping costs."

Mark boxed up and shipped out 13 cases of books.

Following Volunteer/Closet Cleanup Day, we found many more books. Marcy Hotz boxed up another eight cases of books and with the assistance of David Rubenstein, shipped them to the rabbi in Kokomo as well.

At about the same time, Cantor Martin received a request from the Waukesha County jail for prayer books and other Jewish-focused books, both fiction and non-fiction. The Library Committee had recently done a clean-out of old books, and the Temple recently received a donation of more books. Four cases were packed up and hand-delivered by Marcy to the county jail.

Putting books to good use is preferable to taking them out of circulation, and everybody wins.

### **BOOK CLUB REPORT** / By Adrian Richfield

## Book a mix of drama, history

Playing With Fire, the latest book by multitalented Tess Gerritsen, manages to create a combustible mix of contemporary family drama and a touch of European WW II



history. At its core we find a strange and mysterious musical score.

Gerritsen, both a physician and a prolific author, has turned out 11 Rizzoli and Isles novels plus 16 others. Yes, the *Rizzoli and Isles* TV series is based on Gerritsen's novels. *Playing with Fire*, from 2015, departs a bit in content and background, but keeps within her usual thriller genre.

Main character Julia Ansdell is a second violinist in a Boston string quartet. She finds an antique musical score while browsing in a music store in Italy. Intrigued by the piece, she buys it and brings it home to study and play. A bizarre and disturbing event occurs when she first plays the music; her three-year-old daughter is found grasping her mother's leg with a blood-smeared hand. The family cat is dead in another room. What caused this? What is wrong with the child? Does it have anything to do with the music? Those questions need to be answered.

Determined to learn more about the music, the story flashes back in time to the Jewish ghetto in Venice in the 1930s and '40s. There we meet a young violinist who connects with a young cellist to conspire to play a duet at a famous competition. The problem is the young man is Jewish, and the young girl is not, and they are living in Mussolini's Italy.

Against the backdrop of the child's strange and violent medical condition, Gerritsen creates a terrific thriller as the two stories combine into one melody.
