It's Been a Year of Physical and Spiritual Growth and Learning



It is hard to believe that I have just finished my first year at CEEW. For me, this year was a combination of observing the culture and customs of CEEW, while trying to give new and stimulating services, programs and holiday ideas. I am relying on your feedback to see where you thought things were a success and where they can be improved.

We have MANY activities happening through Meetup for congregants of ALL ages, so please sign up and find out about all the fun events that we can share together! One thing that I also want to point out is that we will be observing Tisha B'Av on August 13th with the other Jewish congregations, so please put that date on your calendar.

I'd like to highlight some things that were accomplished last year: Youth High Holy Day services; a Slichot service and Yizkor services; more inter-generational programming, (Purim, Pesach, Yom Hashoah and Yom Haatzmaut). We did a lot of outreach in the community as well, in order to attract new members. We are using social media much more, such as Facebook, Meetup, our website, etc. Many thanks to Mark Levy, Marie Loeffler, Jan Lowell and Rick Steinberg for their help with all of this. Many thanks to Lee Fensin for getting information about our events to the Jewish chronicle and other local newspapers as well!

We have also been involved with Interfaith programs, such as involvement with the Brookfield-Elm Grove Interfaith Network (BEGIN), including the start of a Youth BEGIN group, an Interfaith Thanksgiving at the Brookfield Mosque (at which I spoke) and a Sukkot program with the Mosque. I have also been actively involved with the B'nai Mitzvah students and their parents, helping students write Divrei Torah

speeches and prepare for their ceremonies. Along those lines, I worked in the school and developed a more comprehensive Confirmation class where Joe Dailey and I co-taught both ethics and Jewish text, culminating in a meaningful Confirmation service on June 10th. We had a lovely Picnic Shabbat on June 17th at Frame Park and, by popular demand, will have another one on July 15th. I have done pastoral work in the hospitals and at hospice, adding *shivah* or memorial services for those who wish to have them. We rejoiced as six people converted to Judaism, four of whom have remained active at CEEW, becoming valuable members of our community!

Happily, as of July 1st, I will be done with my half time job in Madison at Temple Beth El. I am very much looking forward to having more time to concentrate my efforts for CEEW and I predict another very exciting year ahead.

For next year, I would like to start participating in the Religious School on a weekly basis and visiting the students more often. I would like us to develop a Hebrew curriculum that could be learned on line with the access of a teacher correcting their homework, along with an actual Hebrew school session during the week for those who can attend. I will be working with YEC and the new PTO to find out what our families want and how to develop it. I will be writing a new comprehensive B'nai Mitzvah handbook. I would love to develop a Confirmation curriculum that goes for three years, culminating with the Confirmation service in 10th grade. Within those three years, we will train our students to become teachers' aids and then teachers in our classrooms. I'd like to go on a class trip with our students in 10th grade. I would like to have more programs for

Interfaith couples / families. I will be starting an intro to Judaism and a Biblical Hebrew / prayer book Hebrew class with the option to have a Bar/Bat Mitzvah.

I have been very fortunate to have our Principal, Phil Musickant, my "partner in the Divine", helping me to understand what has happened and worked in the past. I have thrown a LOT of new things at him this year, but he has taken it with good humor and great thought, as well as a lot of hard work! It has been a pleasure to work with him this year, and I look forward to working with him next year and beyond!

I have also been very fortunate to have our very competent Administrator, Marcy Hotz, helping me with the nuts and bolts and organization of the Temple details. She has been incredibly helpful by sending out letters, writing notices, keeping track of *yahrzeits* and people who are ill, making up booklets for holidays, and the list could go on and on. She is my right-hand woman, and I was able to do so much more clergy work because she was there to help me with everything else.

Although they are too numerous to name them all, we have incredible volunteers in this congregation! The dedication and warmth of our congregants are unbelievable and I want to thank everyone, whether it is the teachers and parents in the school or individual congregants. They make the building run smoothly, plan and implement programming for our congregants, organize Soup-er Shabbats on the first Friday of the month, do holiday planning, adult programming, etc., etc., etc. The Temple could not do half as much without so many fabulous people pitching in!

We created a new membership category, Associate Member, so that aspiring converts can have a formal status in our community as they study to enter a covenant with the Jewish people. We enacted a budget that, while still in deficit, extends our spiritual leader's relationship with us and continues to provide some administrative assistance to her.

A major desire of mine is to form a robust and active committee charged with helping our efforts to attract new members, retain current members and enliven the engagement of members who've drifted away from the core of community life for one reason or another. To label this the "Membership Committee" wouldn't do it justice, but I don't currently have a better name for this group which, I hope, will be composed of members of all ages (teens are needed too!). Since the record-keeping aspects of membership are mostly handled by the treasurer on the computer, it's the more relational aspects of the task that need nurturing. If you'd like to be involved in welcoming, social or other activities geared to establishing or improving connections among members, or building connections between non-members and our temple, we need you! trying it at five homes for the first time, and hope to expand it in the future.

I mentioned our deficit budget earlier. Those at the annual meeting received pledge/donor cards, and those who couldn't attend have received them by mail. We didn't raise dues and haven't for a number of years, but we continue to run deficit budgets. If we raised dues to fill in that deficit — the true cost of our programs and staff — we'd be asking \$600+ per family (half that for singles); but we haven't. To mark the religious training for a girl in Jewish life, one has a Bat Mitzvah, but what if it is two girls at the same time? From the same family? And they are twins?

This religious turning point for the Youso girls, Alexandra and Bridgette, will become a reality on Saturday, Aug. 20th. To publicly fulfill this opportunity, one is called up for the reading of the Torah. The young girl now has religious rights extended to her and takes full responsibility for the observance of all the precepts and commandments in the Jewish faith.

These two girls are ready to embark on this venture.

Bridgette Youso, a.k.a. Bree, will be an eighth-grader this fall at Brookfield Academy where she has gone to school since elementary grades. Her favorite subject is science, and her favorite extra-curricular activities are volleyball in the fall and track in the spring. Her best track events are the 100 meter, 200 meter and the 4x100 relay.

She plans to finish high school at Brookfield Academy, and may like to study some form of psychology in college.

Besides doing a lot of homework (middle school is harder than high school, she thinks), Bree likes to watch TV, especially cartoons, but does find some time to read, usually fiction. Hanging out with friends includes lots of game-playing, especially outside at

night when they play a serious game of "hide and seek" in the dark.

She dislikes short hair and is determined to keep hers in a longish mode, but remembers clearly when she was in elementary school she decided to just cut a little bit of her hair herself. The result was a horrendous mess and necessitated a short haircut by a professional. That could have been her last short hairstyle. No one at school could believe she had short hair.

When she is able to do some traveling besides up to Door County where the family enjoys some summer fun time, Bree is interested in going to Iceland to see the famous volcanoes. She also thinks Sweden has a "cool" government, and would like to travel to the other Scandinavian countries as well. Our cold Midwest winters must be something she enjoys, but a summer visit to Scandinavia

would be a great trip.

The one thing she cooks at home is scrambled eggs. She found an interesting recipe that includes lemon juice as part of the ingredients along with the usual milk, butter, salt and pepper. She claims that you don't really taste the lemon but it adds a lot to her recipe for Bree scrambled eggs.

She is preparing for her Bat Mitzvah with her tutor, Ann Meyers. According to Bree, Mrs. Meyers is "always doing good things and is such a positive person". She has helped out a lot with her preparation for the big event. Her portion of the Torah deals with exploring the Ten Commandments and she calls it the "nagging parents" portion.

Mrs. Meyers commented: "Bree has taken to learning how to chant Torah and haftarah as few students do. She has a knack for it and enjoys the challenge of learning the less common trop. She also

has a lovely voice and I've enjoyed working with Bree very much."

Although she may be a little nervous on that day, she knows this Bat Mitzvah is part of three important things in Jewish life: life, death and becoming a Bat Mitzvah. The Youso Bat Mitzvah project will be collecting and donating school supplies to a deserving educational facility.
