Bill, who died Sept. 20th at age 96, was devoted to his family, especially his wife of 72 years Riva, who died in 2014.

"Bill and Riva made the perfect couple," Sisterhood Co-President Cindy Levy said. "It was amazing to watch them together and see how much Bill cared for

Likes

Bill was devoted to his family members and could kvell for hours about them. Bill also loved Judaism.

Other "likes" included:

- Daughter-in-law Ann's potato pancakes
- Swing music

Riva as her health failed her. Everyone should have such a caretaker. It was clear how much Bill missed Riva on her passing."

Bill was known as a proud Jew, a man of integrity who had a passion and love of humanity.

He began general surgery training at Mt. Sinai Hospital in Mil-

waukee, but then was called to serve as a surgeon in the U.S. Army where he achieved the rank of captain. After the war, he completed his residency and became the first Board Certified General Surgeon at Waukesha Memorial Hospital in 1950. He provided what Cantor Deborah Martin, CEEW's spiritual leader, described as "warm and compassionate care" to his patients for 40 years, then continued his practice for another 20 years after having helped develop QuadMed at Quad/Graphics.

Bill reluctantly retired at age 90. "My dad would say, 'Work equals longevity,' son Steve Merkow said. "It sure worked out for him."

Cindy Levy said Bill and Riva "knew how to gently influence the direction of projects without causing any discourse, and they always seemed to take the synagogue in a positive direction. I do not think the remodeling of the sanctuary would have made it through the process without



Marsha Fensin considered Bill and Riva as "such wonderful role models in temple participation. Even though their children had long since completed their Religious School education, Bill and Riva were always at school-wide functions. Purim and Simchat Torah; they were there. Israel Independence Day, Friday night services, Sisterhood functions; they were there."

Bill and Riva, along with Jim Frisch, donated one of our Torah scrolls in memory of one of their sons, Robert.

Phil Musickant noted that Riva and Bill were also great supporters of Israel, and there is a photo in our archives in the hallway outside the sanctuary of Riva with David Ben-Gurion, Zionist leader and the first Prime Minister of Israel.

Bill and Steve Merkow along with Nate Kraines formed the committee to seed the project of building the CEEW sanctuary.

tion by helping promote the community's longevity in this way. He said he was glad to hear I was trying to do something about the temple's long-term finances but he didn't think he could come to meetings very often as he wasn't driving at night any longer.

"I assured him we couldn't have such an effort start without his advice, that we'd make sure to include him as an emeritus member of the committee and be sure to keep him in the loop. The last update I gave Bill was about 2 1/2 weeks before he passed away; he smiled to hear plans were moving forward."

Cantor Martin began Bill's memorial service with the blowing of a shofar because it is traditional to do so every day in the month before Rosh Hashanah.

It was bittersweet for her "because I did this for Bill the night before he died. When I blew the shofar, his eyes opened wide and he took the shofar and caressed it."

Cindy Levy said, "Bill and Riva Merkow leave a legacy both with their offsprings and their accomplishments with the founding and support of our synagogue."

Arlene Spanier added, "The death of Bill leaves a hole in the congregation that will be impossible to fill."

Elly and Nate Kraines joined CEEW in 1966, and Bill, who was temple president from 1962-64, immediately put Elly to work. "Bill came up to me and asked me if I would be the treasurer," Elly recalled. "I asked, 'What does the treasurer do?' He replied: 'Pay the bills and put the incoming checks into the bank.' I said that did not seem to be so hard, but I did not realize that the books had to balance at the end of the fiscal year.

"Oh, but I did find out, and I made it my mission to find every penny to balance."

SECURITY UPDATE: Door reinforced, exterior lights improved

Our congregation is trying to add to the safety and security of the synagogue and school. A number of things that have been done, include:

- installing a security laminate to reinforce the parking lot doors and first floor windows;
- having the school run fire drills and emergency drills;
- adding a special doorbell that allows for observing who is at the door;
- making sure that all exterior lighting works properly.

One of the main responses has been to hire Waukesha County sheriffs for security. We have always had security coverage at the High Holy Days, but now we are adding it to the Religious School as well. The cost of armed sheriffs is being covered by donations, because there has not been sufficient money in the synagogue security budget for that much coverage. Parents and others are covering the cost for Sundays, for the Friday nights when the students are participating

in the services, and for the Saturday night of Purim in March.

The cost for this coverage is \$120 for each Sunday (8:45 to

The cost for this coverage is \$120 for each Sunday (8:45 to 11:45 a.m.), and \$80 for each Friday night (6:45 to 8:45 p.m.).

There has been discussion about security coverage for other Friday night services, but that would need to be paid through donations.

If you wish to donate for Sunday coverage, we ask you to send a check with the memo line "For Sunday security coverage" to CEEW Treasurer Alan Meyers. A check for Friday night services should include "For Friday night security coverage." Each of these will have its own budget line, so the money will go directly for security coverage for the time you have chosen.

While there has never been any kind of threat to the school or synagogue, it is incumbent on the Board and on Phil Musickant as the principal to make sure that we are proactive regarding safety and security.

BOOK CLUB REPORT / By Adrian Richfield

Dark chapter in America's history explored

Bestselling novelist Jodi Picoult has been hailed by critics as a master storyteller who often pushes the reader to think about making choices. *Second Glance* achieves new dimensions in her craft.

The novel delves into being a ghost story, an intricate tale of love and a history of the Abenaki Indian Tribe. It explores a little-known and dark chapter in America's history, the Vermont eugenics project of the 1920s.

The main character, Ross Wakeman, wants a reuniting with his dead fiancé, and he has failed numerous suicide attempts aimed at achieving that goal. When a local developer wants to



build on land the Indians believe is an ancient burial ground, things in the town start to become weird.

Ross is hired to see if there is really anything to the strange goings-on in the town, and the best of the story begins.

Suspense and the supernatural weave themselves into a complex story. Picoult's ability to bring her characters all vividly to life in this murky environment is quite remarkable.

One *Kirkus* review said, "Exploring the dark history of America's eugenics movement, Picoult sneaks in a ghost story with a gratifying blend of gothic melodrama and social critique."

Technology shapes our memories of Holocaust

WHO: Dr. Rachel N. Baum, speaker

WHAT: Anne Frank on Instagram: Digital Citizenship and Moral Imagination after the Holocaust

Are we bystanders to atrocity, as were so many in the 1930s and 40s? In this talk, Dr. Baum suggests that the answers to these questions might be found in rethinking citizenship in our digital world, in ways that create a greater sense of moral and emotional responsibility to others.

CEEW to form Emergency Response Team

The CEEW Security Committee is looking for volunteers willing to prepare to be well equipped for a variety of emergencies that could arise at Temple.

Committee Chair Marc Schneider is hoping for people who would be trained to respond from the time an emergency happens on CEEW property until the Waukesha first responders arrive, and even after that. No prior training would be necessary, he said.

Marc anticipates there will be no need to limit the number of people who can be

trained to serve on the CEEW Emergency Response Team.

Ari Friedman, the security specialist for the Milwaukee Jewish Federation, evaluated CEEW's security preparedness a few months ago. He suggested that we form such a team.

Marc emphasized the need to work with police and fire department first responders, who would probably arrive in five or six minutes. A major emphasis would go, he said, to developing and maintaining plans for various emergencies.

Marc explained that, in case of an emergency, one of the team members would be designated to be in charge. "The other team members would work under that person's direction," he said. "As an example, in the case of a medical emergency, the in-charge team member would stay with the person in distress while directing another team member to meet the first responders at the door to report on the situation and guide them to the right location."

Larger organizations, those with 10 or more full-time staff members, are required by OSHA to have "a command structure that



takes charge in the event of an emergency." In other environments, the same kind of team might be called a crisis management team. In fact, Marc had served on just such a team when he worked at American Transmission Company in Pewaukee.

Marc anticipates that activities and training for members of the CEEW Emergency Response Team might come from a nearby Red Cross facility. That training will eventually include things like:

- Communicating with local first responders via 911 calls, which can sometimes be complicated by circumstances
- Coordinating with local first responders and providing them with fast, accurate situation assessments
- The creation of a variety of emergency plans, such as procedures for fire evacuations and using designated tornado shelters and procedures to account for everyone and procedures for determining when a situation is no longer dangerous before giving an all-clear message
- Improving the communication systems that would be used in case of an emergency
- Training in the proper use of fire extinguishers
- Identification of potential hazards
- Formal Red Cross training in first aid, use of an automatic external defibrillator (AED) and CPR
- Training about how to deal with bomb threats and suspicious mail
- Other training as needed.

Marc emphasized that, in some emergencies, the first few minutes are crucial in saving a life. He cited the examples of choking, severe bleeding and heart attack.
