David Merkow's lineage leads him to fighting battle he never saw coming

He's been called to help fight coronavirus

From the childhood dream of playing professional golf to the ongoing process of becoming an orthopedic surgeon, **David Merkow** always has found a way to make long distances work.

But he could never have imagined it would bring him to where he is today.

Members of the Merkow family have been long-time supporters of Congregation Emanu-El of Waukesha. David's late grandfather, Bill, is a former CEEW president.

David is finishing his second year of residency at New York University. "It's a five-year program and then most people in orthopedic surgery do a oneyear fellowship after that, so just about everybody specializes from there," Merkow said.

While Merkow's focus is orthopedic surgery, he's been called to help in another area — the fight against coronavirus. He's been doing so with his wife, **Jordan**, who is also in postgraduate training at NYU to become a primary care doctor.

"My wife and I wanted to come to New York to train because we thought we would see anything and everything here," Merkow said. "But we weren't

expecting this."

Both have been heavily involved with COVID-19 patients, and while each has managed to stay healthy, it's been a scary situation for both.

"There's just so much that's unknown," Merkow said. "It was really hard for me thinking about my wife going to work on a COVID unit and in the ICU with all COVID patients. There were a couple of times I just broke down and cried thinking about her going to work and just hoping she was going to be OK."

While Merkow said his wife has been on the front lines more so than himself, he also has stepped out of his comfort zone and put himself in harm's way.

"Just because we're short-staffed, I've been taking care of patients who are very sick, doing everything we can to take the best care of them we can," Merkow said. "But it's a numbers game. A lot of residents have been out sick."

Merkow's family has its fingerprints all over the medical field. His grandfather, **Bill**, took care of patients until he retired at age 90. Both of David's parents, **Steve and Ann**, are doctors. His older brother, **Max**, is a neurosurgeon in northern California; his sister, **Alana**, is a physician's assistant in Baltimore, and his younger brother, **Gabe**, is studying to be a physical therapist in Milwaukee.

While living in Chicago, Merkow met Jordan (Scher) in 2010 before becoming an assistant men's golf coach at Marquette University for two seasons and eventually shifting his focus to — David Merkow

medicine.

"We were together in Chicago from 2012 to 2014, and we were actually

long distance in med school," Merkow said. "I went to med school in Philly at Jefferson Medical College. She went to med school at George Washington in D.C., so we were long distance for four years and then we married after our first year of med school (in 2015)."

In a former life, Merkow's main focus was golf. He helped Arrowhead High School win its first state title in boys golf in 2001. In 2006, he was the Big Ten Player of the Year at Northwestern University. The two-time All-Big Ten performer continued to pursue golf post-college, competing internationally and winning two gold medals at his first Maccabi Games in 2008, while also playing on the Hooters Tour and Gateway Tour.

Those were simpler times for Merkow. Now he stays boarded up in his Manhattan apartment with Jordan to stay safe when he isn't working 24-hour shifts at a Level 1 trauma hospital in Queens.

For now, he'll continue doing the best he can with the hand he's been dealt.

"Something my wife and I said to each other and told friends and loved ones: This is not what we signed up for, but it's what we're being called to do," Merkow said.

know many of you are curious and/or apprehensive about what we will do for the High Holidays.

I have had many discussions with doctors and medical experts. I have read many articles about COVID-19 and the related risks and concerns. I have been in weekly or bi-weekly conversations with my rabbi and cantor colleagues. I have had many conversations with our Temple leaders, and I have been starting conversations with our ritual committee. They and the CEEW Board of Trustees will be helping a great deal in the decisions we make.


I want to assure you that we will do our very best to make these holidays meaningful and joyous, no matter where or how we do them.

That is why we have sent a survey to ask what you want to see and/or hear for the High Holidays, and what things make these services meaningful and special to you. **Please fill out the survey and return by July 2nd.**

We will do our best to include as many of those ideas as possible. Information comes out daily about the rise or fall in cases, about ways to protect ourselves and about possible immunizations.

We need to take things one day at a time.

Even when we eventually have some people in the sanctuary, we will most certainly make the service avail-

able via Zoom at the same time. No one should feel as if they cannot be at High Holiday services because of their concern about contracting COVID-19.

In order to have services in Temple, we have many things to consider. Among the most difficult of those things is that any singing, either from the bimah or from the sanctuary seats, is very dangerous because the force of air would make coronavirus particles travel much farther than six feet.

Also, experts say that being near each other for longer periods of time greatly increases the risk of contracting COVID-19. That's why experts say sitting in restaurants or places of worship is more dangerous than going to a grocery store, which is larger and where you are in and out fairly quickly. In taking all this into consideration, I am mindful of the highest law in Judaism, which is *Pikuach Nefesh* or the preservation of life.

Jewish teachings tell us to respect human life. Every human being is an entire world. To save a life is to save the entire world. To destroy a life is to destroy an entire world. To help others live is a corollary of this principle.

These are the ideals we will keep in mind when making our decisions regarding the High Holidays. Every one of your lives is precious to us, and we want to ensure your safety.

If we feel it is not safe to have services in the Temple, we will act accordingly. If we feel we should limit the number of people coming to Temple — if we need to make sure they are far apart and wearing masks — we will make those decisions based on the facts that we know at the time.

Eventually, we will most likely shorten the services, both to lessen the time you have to stare at a screen if you are on Zoom, or to avoid having us in the same room for long periods of time.

IF we allow some people to come into the Temple, we will take stringent precautions.

Whether the services are in Temple or by Zoom, I will be on the bimah to give you the feeling that you are also there.

We can look at this as an opportunity to be creative and to make these holidays special in a way we never have before.

You can make yourself a sanctuary in your home by creating a holy space. I will help you create that space.

One day at a time — our principles will guide us

uring these times of great change because of COVID-19, and turmoil over racial injustice, we need to take a step back, breathe and just take things one day at a time.

As someone in my Midrash class reminded me, we are in the middle of an era when "history is being made." We, our children, grandchildren and greatgrandchildren will look back and wonder how we lived through it and what we learned from the experience.

The great spiritual leaders and meditation experts tell us it is important to live in the moment. Don't waste time in the past. It's over, and we can't change it. Don't waste time thinking only about the future. (Yes, I know we need to make plans and goals, but things can change at any moment, as we have certainly learned.)

Make sure you live in the moment. Take the time to savor what you have, and what you can do in the here and now. Really spend time with loved ones, and give them your attention (not while on the computer or phone doing other work). Take time to go outside and enjoy and revel in the nature around you, even if you have to wear a mask.

A clergy friend gave me these seven strategies for coping with change by **Reverend Holly Whitcomb**, an author, spiritual director and retreat leader. I find them very helpful, especially at this time.

1. Accept a new normal: We have been dealing with COVID-19 for about three months now, and there have been up and down changes since the start. What does this change in our life mean to you right now? What support do you need? How can you use this time as a time of personal growth?

2. Strengthen what remains: As you are experiencing change in your life right now, what wisdom is there here for you? At the present time, how

will you strengthen what remains? To strengthen what remains also requires that we accept our limitations. What insights are you receiving from accepting your limitations?

3. Practice equanimity: Equanimity means "even mind" or "equal feelings." **Sharon Salzberg**, a central figure in the field of meditation, says, "Equanimity is a spacious stillness of the mind, a radiant calm that allows us to be present fully with all the different changing experiences that constitute ... our lives." How might practicing equanimity help you right now?

4. Trust yourself: In any period of change, it helps to trust yourself. What have you survived, and what confidence do you bring from having coped with change in the past?

5. Surrender worry: Mark Twain said, "I have been through some terrible things in my life, some of which actually happened." In any period of change, it helps to surrender worry. What are you most worried about right now? What could you do to surrender this worry today? What do you need from God?

6. Trust God: In any period of change, it helps to trust God. How has God been present to you in the past? What graces have you received?

7. Honor the pause: In any period of change, it helps to honor "the pause." The spiritual director said, "Rest, wait, see what God will do." Are you stopping? What helps you to gain perspective?

A lot of her ideas express staying in the moment and taking things one day at a time.

I pray daily for your good health and safety. As always, feel free to call me if you are having any difficulties or just need to talk. Please let me know if you or a family member are ill or have other needs.

Stay positive and happy and know that you are part of our Temple family, which means we will be there for each other in times of happiness, sadness and stress.

ANNUAL REVIEW MEETING Slate of officers, budget pass unanimously

By unanimous consent, the voting members of Congregation Emanu-El of Waukesha approved the slate of officers as presented at the June 7th Annual Meeting.

Laurie Schwartz will serve a twoyear term as president; Mark Levy will serve a one-year term as vice president; Alan Meyers will serve a oneyear term as treasurer; Denise Stodola will serve a one-year term as secretary; Bernie Sandler and Mari-Claire Zimmerman will each serve two-year CEEW President Laurie Schwartz ran terms as trustees.

Doug Anson and Elizabeth Hamlin will each serve out the remaining year of a two-year term as trustees. Ann Meyers automatically began a term as immediate past president.

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The budget for the 2020-21 fiscal year, as presented by the Board, passed unanimously.

Treasurer Alan Mevers explained that he anticipates that the 2019-20 budget will finish with a \$7,800 deficit, but the specific end-of-year number can not be stated this early because of incomplete income and expenses. By the time of the meeting — and going through the entire 2019-20 fiscal year - the accounting for our \$14,000 federal loan treats it as a loan in need of repayment.

If — as is anticipated — the federal government forgives the loan, it will show up as income in our 2020-21 financial records. "The loan does not show up in the income for this year nor in the income budget for next year," Alan said. "Assuming it is forgiven, this will pay this year's deficit and help with next year's deficit."

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Cantor Martin said that, in these particularly difficult times, "we need our faith to hold us up ... like a Jewish

family supporting each other in times of need."

She reported on a large number of congregational services, observations, initiatives, interfaith efforts and speaking engagements in the past year. As we all know, our doors have been closed since shortly after Purim. We have been able to maintain a close community via Zoom services and meetings, she reported. The necessity of using Zoom has kept things even busier than usual, she said.

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President Laurie Schwartz reported that members of the CEEW leadership were "pleasantly surprised by the numbers of members who are attending our online programs. In many ways ... it has made our community stronger."

We will continue to work with interfaith groups "to find common ground in various tikkun olam projects."

CEEW's leadership will learn from and consult with other Wisconsin Jewish groups to identify best practices with regard to the pandemic.

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Vice President Mark Levy reported briefly on the current status of the Spiritual Leader Search Committee. Cantor Martin plans to retire as of

July 1, 2021. There is still room for

more volunteers on the committee. Its activity should pick up soon.

Mark anticipates that the committee will work closely with the Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR) and the American Conference of Cantors (ACC).

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Our religious school teachers are Aviva Bergtrom, K through 2nd grades; Sarah Berry, 3rd and 4th grades; and **Marie Loeffler**, 5th through 7th grades.

Education Director Carrie Barbakoff taught frequently during the year and taught mid-week Hebrew classes for beginning and intermediate students. Cantor Martin taught the advanced students. Because of the pandemic, all educational programming has shifted to an online experience.

Carrie gave a PowerPoint presentation highlighting the school year.

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Forty members attended this year's meeting virtually, compared to 31 who attended last year when the meeting was held in the social hall.

Motion to raise dues rejected at annual meeting

A motion to raise dues by \$20 for families and \$10 for singles to help reduce our deficit was rejected at the Annual Meeting, which was held June 7th via Zoom.

Past President **Marcy Hotz**, who made the motion, said, "We are running a deficit year after year. That's just not right. We have to do something."

Several members said the timing wasn't right because of the pandemic, and preferred to fundraise more. It also was suggested that those who are able be asked to give the Temple more than their required dues.

Former Board of Trustees member **Adrian Richfield** said if members donate to Temple funds, "we can raise more money than we can by raising dues."

Adrian said she has confidence in the decisions of Temple leadership, especially Treasurer **Alan Meyers**, "to keep everything on track and do the best we can."

Last year, dues were raised \$100 per family membership and \$50 per single membership. There was no change made last year in school tuition.

The dues remain as: single membership, \$1,150; family membership, \$2,300.

There was discussion about raising religious school tuition by a small percentage, but after the motion to raise dues was rejected, a motion was not made concerning tuition.

Religious school tuition remains \$425 per student, while midweek Hebrew tuition remains \$200 per student.





Kids will be missing a lot without OSRUI and Interlaken

July and August are great months to live in Wisconsin. It is warm, sunny and there are lakes, streams, forests and many natural wonders that are still here despite the pandemic or the unrest among us in our society.

Usually outdoor festivals are available as well. Wisconsin is a home away from home for many people at overnight camps. People travel from literally all over the world for a few months.

But Summer 2020 is looking very different for most people here in our congregation.

From the Education Director's Desk

At overnight camp kids usually write handwritten letters between themselves and their parents, friends or other family. This summer there is no one telling our children to write handwritten letters, telling our parents and families to tell their kids to put away electronic devices and go play sports, go swimming, build campfires, go water skiing or horseback riding, have a sing-along or participate in teambuilding activities and do all of the other things that might happen at overnight camp.

Our kids who attend OSRUI (the Reform movement's Wisconsin based overnight camp) or the Milwaukee JCC's Camp Interlaken would be immersed in Friday night and Saturday morning Sabbath experiences. They would have Hebrew and Israeli culture around them and used in the daily language of the staff.

Our kids will be missing these Jewish -related activities this summer. These are all challenges. While we can have Zoom Friday night services or Zoom havdalah, they are not the same as being in person with your friends, sitting or standing outside away from parents and the daily stresses of living at home with your siblings and parents.

This coming school year I hope to be able to provide the best possible Judaic and Hebrew education for our students and their families, whether it is in person, on Zoom or a hybrid of the two depending on what provides the safest level of risk to everyone involved.

I invite parents, kids and congregants to share with me what they have learned from being at home on a Friday night logging onto Zoom for services, or logging into Zoom religious or Hebrew school classes, engaging in a Zoom art project or a Zoom holiday program.

Or perhaps not logging into something provided by CEEW and engaging in something Jewish as a family or individually.

I hope everyone is able to find the good in themselves and those around them and use that good to motivate themselves or someone around them to do something positive this summer.

BEGIN Statement Denouncing Racism

June 22, 2020

Cantor Martin was one of many area spiritual leaders to sign the below statement:

Over the past several weeks, we have been confronted yet again by the ugly reality of racism in this country. The deaths of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery, and Rayshard Brooks are only the latest in a long litany of black and brown lives cut short by acts of violence and terror. **As** religious leaders of the Brookfield-Elm Grove Interfaith Network (BEGIN), we denounce the evil of racism, and we stand in solidarity with our congregants and neighbors of color.

Many of us serve in predominantly white communities, and we recognize and confess the ways those of us who are white are complicit in perpetuating systems of racism that deny the inherent sacred worth and dignity of our siblings of color. As leaders of diverse faith traditions, we grieve and lament this reality, and we are committed to working in and with our local communities to dismantle oppressive systems through prayer and action:

1. PRAYER: We pray for the families of all black and brown persons who have been killed by police. We pray for the protesters on the ground in cities across the country whocontinue to demonstrate in order to publicly denounce injustice. We pray for the safety and wisdom of public officials and law enforcement officers that they might strive to dismantle oppressive systems and to work for justice for all whom they serve.

2. ACTION: For those who have the means, we encourage donations to the work and care of protestors and activ-

ists on the ground in Minneapolis, Milwaukee, and other places.

Local religious communities can point to trusted places to share your resources. For those of us who are white, we also encourage education as we grapple with the role of race and racism in the United States.

Some suggested resources include: Tori Williams Douglass's *White Homework* (https://www.toriglass.com/whitehomework-lessons), Debby Irving's *Waking Up White*, Ibram X. Kendi's *How to Be an Antiracist* Jennifer Harvey's *Raising White Kids*, and Ijeoma Oluo's So You Want to Talk about Race.

As leaders of BEGIN, we yearn for the day when peace and justice overcome hatred and division, and we call on people of all faiths to join us in this work.
