On Doing Judaism Well

n a traditional synagogue, Torah is read aloud on Shabbat, Festivals, Mondays, and Thursdays. Reading Torah on Shabbat and Festivals is understandable, but... why Mondays and Thursdays?

The Rabbis' explanation was that no Jew should go more than three days without hearing words of Torah, but another reason for this custom was purely pragmatic: Mondays and Thursdays were the market days in Biblical Jerusalem. The people were already there, so public reading from the Torah was done on those days.

I thought about this pragmatism during our celebration of Shavuot last month. That Saturday evening we observed Havdalah, had a Jewish Trivia contest, did a little bit of learning, enjoyed some live music provided by A'band'n All Hope, and, of

course, ate cheesecake! It was a lovely and creative evening.

One of my teachers, Dr. Larry Hoffman, wrote an article some years ago called "Doing It Right or Doing It Well." From a halachic perspective, CEEW did not observe Shavuot "right." We didn't have a worship service, we didn't hear the 10 Commandments read from the Torah, and we didn't stay up all night studying. (Yes, that's a thing on Shavuot!)

Instead, thanks to the Adult Education Committee we had a creative Shavuot "experience" that appealed

to lots of people. I would say that CEEW did Shavuot "well" this year.

As I begin my second year as your Spiritual Leader, I look forward to continuing to work with Temple leadership and CEEW members to create new and different ways of observing and celebrating our ancient traditions.

Reform Judaism has changed dramatically since the days of my childhood, and I know that it will continue to evolve. Together, let's make Congregation Emanu-El a place where we "do Judaism well."

To me, this means I start to think about the upcoming holidays...the High Holidays: Yom Kippur and Rosh HaShanah. Since this issue of the bulletin will cover both July and August, it is not too soon to remind members of CEEW that in August they will be receiving phone calls and/or e-mails asking each of them to participate in the High Holiday services for CEEW.

Molly Schmidt has an Adventure at the Maccabi Games

olly Schmidt first heard of the JCC Maccabi Games in January of 2020 from her aunt. Her 14-year-old cousin was going to swim with her JCC that summer at the competition. Molly was too young to participate that year, and the Games were canceled for that summer —and the summer of 2021.

This year, the JCC Maccabi Games will be held in San Diego, hosted by The Lawrence Family JCC on the Jacobs Family Campus in early August. Molly's cousin is not going, but Molly will be participating in the Maccabi Games. With help from Education Director Carrie Barbakoff, Molly was able to join the five-person delegation from the Milwaukee JCC.

The JCC Maccabi Games are an Olympic-style competition for Jewish teens from 13 to 16 years old. Athletes from the United States, Canada, Mexico, Israel, and a few other countries compete in events such as swimming, basketball, volleyball, baseball, soccer, ice hockey, flag football, dance, golf, e-sports, swimming, tennis, and table tennis.



Molly is excited to meet not only other Jewish teens from the Milwaukee area who will be a part of her delegation, but all of the others who will be competing at the games. This year, over 3,000 teen athletes will be participating.

Molly is expecting to swim in 12 events, including two relays that will

be made up of athletes from a mix of JCCs.

"The idea of meeting and competing with so many other Jewish athletes is exciting and fun!" Molly said. "The competitor in me is looking forward to competing on a national level to see how I do."

We here at CEEW wish Molly all the best! We will follow up with her Maccabi Games adventure when she returns in August.

President's Letter

From the Desk of Co-President Deb Hacker

I often think about the wonderful prayer we use to sing in English at our Shabbat services called "Grant us Peace, (Thy most precious gift"). Originally written into the old *Union Prayer* book (1984-1895), it was based on the Sim Shalom and Shalom Rav prayers. The Union Prayer Book, noted for its brevity, was published more than a century ago, and "stated the essence of liberal Judaism" according to Rabbi Lawrence Hoffman. It preceded the Gates of Prayer we used to pray from.




In the "sleepless summer" of 2019, I wrote my own version of this prayer which began "Grant Me *sleep*, Thy most precious gift." Music and Tehillim (Psalms) became part of my sleep hygiene program to cure my 2-4 a.m. insomnia which was initiated by the frequent cries of our new puppy. Psalm 8 was especially helpful: "In peace and harmony will I lie down and sleep, for You, G-d alone

make me dwell in security." The verse 4:5 says, "Tremble and do not sin; reflect in your hearts upon your beds, and be silent". This verse teaches us to recite the bedtime Shema prayer. This prayer is thought to protect a person physically and spiritually during sleep (Midrash Tehillim). Putting oneself in the right frame of mind and stating the Oneness of G-d definitely promotes sleep.

Now a person can practice daily exercise, relaxation or meditation before bed, keep the bedroom dark, cool and quiet, avoid stimulating TV or social media, enjoy a nighttime brew of herbal tea, all to help promote sleep. But the wonderful teachings, songs and Tehillim *connect* us to our larger Jewish family stretching all the way back to King David (thought to be the author of the Tehillim).

Connection is what CEEW Sisterhood is about — bonding and praying with other women, learning together, helping each other and the community, and laughing together. We hope you can all join us for our annual Sisterhood Shabbat in Frame Park Pavilion at 7 p.m. on Friday, July 8th where you will hear women's voices join


Desperately Seeking Inspiration?


