



Mari-Claire Zimmerman's article about heart health, starting on page 17, examines heart attack symptoms and risk factors for men and women. Did you know that queer, trans, and gender diverse people have additional factors affecting cardiovascular health?

According to the American Heart Association Journal publication, *Circulation*, "There is growing evi-

dence that people who are transgender and gender diverse (TGD) are impacted by disparities across a variety of cardiovascular risk factors compared with their peers who are cisgender. Prior literature has characterized disparities in cardiovascular morbidity and mortality as a result of a higher prevalence of health risk behaviors. Mounting research has revealed that cardiovascular

risk factors at the individual level likely do not fully account for increased risk in cardiovascular health disparities among people who are TGD. Excess cardiovascular morbidity and mortality is hypothesized to be driven in part by psychosocial stressors across the lifespan at multiple levels, including structural violence (eg, discrimination, affordable housing, access to health care)."

We went to the Tenement Museum, we had an amazing walking tour of the Lower East Side, we visited a Kosher grocery and a Judaica shop on the Upper West Side, we had dinner at the 2nd Ave. Deli (which is no longer located on 2nd Ave.), and we attended a lively Friday evening Shabbat service at B'nai Jeshurun. There was also some time for some fun in NYC, including a visit to the Museum of Natural History, a walkthrough Central Park on Saturday afternoon and Dim Sum on Sunday morning in Chinatown!

The high point of the trip for me, and I suspect for many of the participants as well, was the Saturday morning visit to Ellis Island. Surprisingly, this was my first visit to this historic site.

My ancestors did not come through Ellis Island; they made their way to America by different ways and at different times. But when standing in the Great Hall, realizing how many people came through this place looking to make a new life for themselves in this country, I felt an overwhelming sense of... awe.

Today Ellis Island is a museum which had once been a 'secular' governmental facility, but I felt the same kind of reverence I feel when entering a beautiful synagogue, church, mosque, or any other sacred space. I could almost hear a voice whispering "Take off your shoes; this is Holy Ground."

At one of our Friday evening services this summer, the congregation will have the opportunity to hear the thoughts of the students who went on this trip. Please come and hear what they have to say, and ask them about chocolate egg creams!

- I. **Welcome** by President Laurie Schwartz: The meeting was called to order at 9:41 am.
 - II. **Opening Prayer** by Cantor Martin Levson
- III. **Approval of the Minutes** Minutes from the June 12, 2022 Annual Meeting were approved as submitted by unanimous vote.
- IV. **Spiritual Leader's Report** by Cantor Martin Levson: In addition to his written report Cantor recalled for us the Shavuot Trivia night which was so fun and so successful it was repeated recently. Such successful events are how we all support our congregation.

We are all standard bearers for non-Orthodox, progressive Judaism in this area. Events like these are what a vibrant congregation should look like. Although we face challenges of decreased affiliation, challenging economics,

and powerful social currents, we should not lose sight of the things we are doing well.




Recently the cantor discussed the impact of the pandemic on membership with a non-Jewish spiritual leader. He learned that they had lost 1/3 of their membership during that time. It could have been worse.

We at CEEW are doing well, and we look forward to moving forward, being strong, and strengthening one another.

V. Education Director's Report – by Carrie Barbakoff: In addition to summarizing her detailed written report, Carrie Barbakoff quoted Abraham Lincoln in saying 'Tell me and I forget, teach me and I may remember, involve me and I learn.' This axiom has informed her teaching approach this past year. Using a one room school-house concept she has delivered a high-quality Jewish education to 12 students in the 1st through 7th grades.

Four of these students and their parents will be traveling to NYC with Ann Meyers, Cantor Levson, and Carrie Barbakoff for an exploration of Jewish heritage, past and present. She extended thanks to teachers Marie Loeffler, Ann Meyers, and Cantor Levson.

VI. **President's Remarks** – by Laurie Schwartz: Adding to her written report, Laurie remarked that it has been a wonderful year of reopening and she is impressed at how vibrant we are for a small congregation. To keep us vibrant, however, we do need new members on our committees and she encouraged members to sign up for something. Rich Steinberg is putting together a Men's Group that will meet at the Starbucks across the street. Hopefully their efforts will add to our programming and help around the temple. She reminded us all that if we see any antisemitic activities, actions, events, to please alert

her or other board members ASAP so we can support and educate our members and the community. Marsha Fensin added that we should call attention to positive events that we can celebrate as well.

VII. **Treasurer's Report and Budget** – by Alan Meyers:

Alan Meyers made the motion that the budget be approved as submitted (calling attention to the written 2023-24 budget that was circulated to the congregation). Denise Stodola seconded.

Discussion included a suggestion from Cindy Levy that in the future we have a more detailed breakdown of the budget. Jennifer Ecker asked about security personnel in the next year. It was suggested that we consider asking the local police rather than depending on off duty officers from the Sheriff's Office. Laurie stressed that she is aware that we need more predictable security coverage, and she will look into alternatives to our current arrangements.

Budget for fiscal year 2023-2024 was approved by unanimous vote with thanks to Alan Meyers for his excellent work.

VIII. Nominating Committee Report and Elec-

tion – by Ann Meyers: Natalie Bledstein withdrew her nomination and was replaced by Cindy Levy. A call for nominations from the floor was made with none forth-

coming.

Ann made the motion that the slate of nominees be adopted as amended. This was seconded by Carol O'Neil. The motion was passed unanimously with thanks to Lauren Schmidt for her past service and thanks to Ann Meyers for her work on this committee.

Keeping Your Heart Healthy

ccording to the Talmud, to save a single life is to save the entire world.

Even Jewish Orthodox doctors will carry a pager or a cell phone if they are on call during Shabbat or holidays. One Lubavitch doctor said he would "drive to the hospital on Yom Kippur eating a ham sandwich if it would save a person's life."

On May 8th, my husband Bill suffered a heart attack.

Prior to going to the hospital, his symptoms were an unusual pain between his shoulder blades, weakness, and fatigue. He was sweaty. He said his back pain was not from doing heavy lifting and that he needed to go to a hospital. Suspecting a heart attack, he took a nitro tablet and an aspirin.

In the emergency room, Bill coded twice and was revived with chest compressions, defibrillator shocks, high flow oxygen, and emergency IV medications. He had a cardiac catheterization done with balloon angioplasty and placement of a stent in an artery in his heart.

What causes a blockage in the heart? It may be plaque which forms on the insides of the arteries and is usually made from cholesterol and lipids, or a blood clot. The plaque may completely block the artery, or the plaque can partially break loose and then a blood clot forms on the rough surface. This can happen slowly or suddenly.

How would you know if you are having a heart attack? You may feel a pain anywhere above your waist. It may be in your

The Vocabulary of a Heart Attack

Cardiac means heart-related. Myocardium refers to the heart muscle.

An *infarction* is muscle death from lack of oxygen.

A myocardial infarction is a heart attack.

A cardiac catheterization is a procedure where the cardiologist pands from the end of the cathe-(heart doctor) threads a thin catheter through into the arteries which feed the heart. Using a radiopaque dye, the cardiologist looks for blockages in these arteries.

A balloon angioplasty exter to open the blockage against the wall of the artery. The stent is threaded over the catheter to hold the artery open. It is like a mesh tube. See the diagram on page 22.



chest, in your back, in your shoulder, arm, or fingers; it could be felt in your jaw or in your teeth. You may feel heartburn which is unrelieved with antacids. You may feel anxiety, short of breath, unusual fatigue, a sense of "impending doom," irregular heart rate, fainting, or dizziness, or you may be sweating when you don't expect to be.

What should you do? If you already have nitroglycerin tablets from having had a previous heart attack, take one and put it under your tongue. If you don't have nitroglycerin, chew a regular aspirin.

If the pain or other symptoms are not relieved, sit down with your phone, take another nitro tablet, and *call 911. Do not ignore the pain.*

Why does this medicine help? Nitroglycerin lowers blood pressure and might help expand the arteries in the heart. Aspirin helps to prevent blood clots from forming.

What else can indicate a cardiac emergency? Feeling an irregular heartbeat, feeling your heart racing when you are at rest or feeling palpitations.

Learn how to check your pulse rate. A normal pulse rate for adults is 60-100 beats per minute (and you should know what is normal for you). If you faint when washing your face or having a bowel movement, you may have a cardiac problem.

"It's just the flu": Heart attack warning signs in women

The symptoms of a heart attack can present
differently for women than they do for men.
They can be mistaken for the flu or acid reflux.
Learn to recognize them.



We've all seen the movie scenes where a man gasps,
 clutches his chest and falls to the ground. In reality, a
 heart attack victim could easily be a woman, and the scene
 may not be that dramatic.

Even when the signs are subtle, the consequences can be deadly, especially if the person doesn't get help right away.

If you have any of these signs, call 911 and get to a hospital right away.

- Uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain in the center of your chest. It lasts more than a few minutes, or goes away and comes back.
- Pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.
- Shortness of breath with or without chest discomfort.
- Other signs such as breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.

As with men, women's most common heart attack symptom is chest pain or discomfort. But women may experience other symptoms that are typically less associated with heart attack, such as shortness of breath, nausea/vomiting and back or jaw pain.


What can cause a cardiac emergency? Side effects of certain medications, use of cocaine or other drugs, too much or too little potassium in your bloodstream, large amount of blood loss, or a lack of oxygen.

A sudden sharp blow to the chest, excessive exercise (such as shoveling heavy snow in the winter or playing handball), uncontrolled diabetes, uncontrolled high blood pressure, or once in a while, there are no warning symptoms at all.

Young athletes have died of heart attacks while playing sports due to an undiagnosed problem with the heart. This is why it is important for young athletes to have physical exams before competition.

In 1999 Adam Lemel, a healthy high school student in Whitefish Bay, was playing basketball when his heart went into a lethal rhythm and he suffered a sudden cardiac arrest. Defibrillation could have saved his life.

Adam's parents started <u>Project ADAM</u> (Automated Defibrillators in Adam's Memory) to supply defibrillators to schools throughout the area and increase awareness of the need for defibrillators in the workplace, houses of worship, sports events, and schools. So far the initiative has saved more than 200 lives.

What can you do? To help yourself, start by talking to your doctor about your risk factors. Quit smoking (or don't start), get regular exercise as recommended by your medical provider, take your medications as ordered, report side effects to your medical provider, have an annual medical exam with lab work, lower the amount of cholesterol in your diet, learn how to check your pulse, and keep your blood pressure under control.

To help others, know the symptoms of heart attack and stroke, learn how to do CPR or chest compressions, and learn how to use an automatic defibrillator. Call 911 if you think you or someone around you is having an emergency.
