Special Shabbat Program on Friday, June 9

Ellyn Lem, professor of English at UWM-Waukesha, will present a short program on Jews in television after Shabbat services on June 9. Ever since *The Goldbergs* graced the small screen in the 1950s, Jewish people have been represented on television – for better and for worse. This talk will cover the many influential shows with central Jewish characters, from *Seinfeld* and *Curb Your Enthusiasm* to *The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel* and *Fleishman Is in Trouble*.

Several shows from Israel will be discussed as well, such as *Fauda*, which has built a huge international following. How these shows represent their Judaism will be explored, along with their degree of authenticity.

This evening will begin with a special Shabbat service at 7 pm, led by Cantor Levson. There will be an oneg from 8:00 to 8:15, followed by the program from approximately 8:15 to 8:45 pm.





2nd Annual Jewish Trivia Night at CEEW





Preview of a Year in Review

he following thoughts are based on my Spiritual Leader Report for the 2023 CEEW Annual Meeting, which will be held on Sunday morning, June 11, at 9:00 AM. Please make every effort to attend. (We will feed you bagels and lox if you do!)

I am grateful that the past programming year has seen a retreat (if not an elimination) of the Covid-19 pandemic, and that life at CEEW has begun to return to "A New Normal." One "silver lining" of the pandemic is that we now can make many of our activities "multi-access": A service or program can be held on-site in the sanctuary and streamed on Zoom, and sometimes recorded as well.

This flexibility has thankfully enabled us to engage with more people than before the pandemic. While technical limitations (especially the lack of a decent wi-fi signal offsite) sometimes make us unable to stream, we will continue, to the best of our ability, to make our services and programs multi-access.

Our wonderful Director of Education, Carrie Barbakoff, made the best of demographic and staffing challenges

to re-imagine our Religious School as a "One Room Schoolhouse" this past year. I appreciated the opportunity to collaborate and to teach with her, and I look forward to continuing to work with her as she begins her new contract with CEEW.

I enjoy a good cup of coffee (or other beverage), and I would love to sit down and chat with you about CEEW and whatever else might be on your mind." This remains as true today as when I wrote it one year ago.

I continue to be grateful for the sacred opportunity to serve as the Sole/Soul Spiritual Leader of Congregation Emanu-El. Together may we continue to create a vibrant and meaningful expression of Reform Judaism here in Waukesha County.

Spiritual Leader's Report

Mark Levy and Carrie Barbakoff have met with the cantor regarding the upcoming year's calendar. Cantor was pleased to report that in the coming year, five B'nai Mitzvah services are planned: lots to look forward to.

Education Director's Report

The annual CEEW Yom HaShoah ceremony took place on April 16 including Jeff Shabman who spoke about his family's experience facing the Holocaust. Carrie and Cantor Levson taught a lesson about Israel's Memorial Day, Yom HaZikaron, a day to remember the many soldiers who were killed, the children who became orphans and the wives who became widows during Israel's wars.

On April 23 we held a Yom HaAtzmaut celebration with the shin shins and learned about life on a Kibbutz. Our 6/7th grade students made a poster about a soldier who was killed in the Yom Kippur War. The

poster was displayed at the community wide Yom HaZikaron ceremony commemorating the 50th anniversary of this war. We also looked at more obscure cities in the north and south of Israel.

The last day of religious school was May 7; we played a Kahoot game to review the 6 values taught: teshuvah (return/repentance), b'tzelem elohim (in the image of God), gevurah (strength), achrayut (responsibility), hakarat hatov (recognizing the good / gratitude), koach hadibbur (power of speech), shalom (peace/hello/good-bye). Then we roasted marshmallows in honor of Lag B'Omer.

Coming up: June 16 will be the end of the year CEEW picnic shabbat; check your emails for time and location. June 22-25 is the Jewish adulting NYC trip.

Alan Meyers presented the proposed budget for 2023-2024, which will be included in the packet to be sent to members about 10 days prior to the June Annual Meeting. All members are encouraged to read that

Nominating Committee: Ann Meyers reported on the slate for election for the annual meeting. The slate will be included in the packet that is being sent to all members. Look for that.

Ethics Policy: A proposed ethics policy has been circulated to the board and Mark Levy would like some input. He suggested that we



could have an attorney look at it. This will be discussed further at a later meeting.

Railing for the Bema: The Sister-hood has offered to donate \$1000.00 for the railing. According to Bernie Sandler, we may need a building permit with drawings to add a step and a railing as it is an addition to the structure of the building. More on this at a later date.

"Israel at 75" from Uria Roth, Milwaukee Israeli Emissary

On Wednesday, May 10, the topic was to be Israel at 75 but Uria Roth had a lot more to share in his presentation. His original topic was precluded by the events of the day which was that 270 rockets had been fired into Israel. Uria attempted to explain that life in Israel was complicated. On one hand, there are the rocket attacks; on the other hand, people in Israel continue to go about their daily lives. While the recent demonstrations showed massive

protests in the streets, who are those people? It was mainly about the long-standing person of most interest in Israel: Netanyahu. Yes, it was about the Supreme Court of Israel

Sisterhood Mizrachi Cooking Demonstration Program

E leven Sisterhood women immensely enjoyed a tasty and fun night of friendship, wine, snacks, and then Mizrachi cooking with chef Hannah Sattler on May 2 at the temple social hall and kitchen.

Hannah regaled us with her cooking background and experiences working as a chef in Milwaukee. She seems to be one of the hardest working women around, running her catering business "Hannah's Kitchen" as well as the "cafe b data" cafe at the JCC. She was recently featured in the Wisconsin Jewish Chronicle. She juggles her professional life and single parenthood, while providing generously to our community.





Mizrahi Jewish cuisine is an assortment of cooking traditions that developed among the Jews of the Middle East, North Africa, Asia, and Arab countries. With the assistance of event organizer Ann Meyers, Hannah demonstrated three Mizrachi foods:

Kleicha, an Iraqi date cookie which was rolled to a thin dough and spread with a date filling. This cookie was a crowd favorite.

Fatayer, Lebanese spinach turnovers shaped like hamentashen. The tender dough was filled with a tart spinach, onion, lemon and sumac filling. Pomegranate molasses added a touch of sweetness to the delicious appetizer.

Joojeh kebab, a Persian saffron chicken kabob, was marinated before the event but threads of saffron were "bloomed" in the marinade.

Ann Meyers commented, "It was gratifying to work on this event for Sisterhood members. I took time to consider who our members are as individuals, and what might interest them. I thought back on some of the excellent programs we've had so I could try to meet that level of quality. Working with Hannah Sattler was a pleasure! As a food-lover and avid cook, I found her relatable and a dream to work with. She brought her sparkle to our members along with the wonderful flavors. I think it was a very successful evening. I'd call on her again in a heartbeat for another foodrelated program."
