## **Looking Towards Hope**

It's been a rough few weeks. (That's putting it mildly.) In the aftermath of the horrific October 7 pogrom that resulted in over 1,400 Israelis killed and over 220 hostages kidnapped into Gaza, the news from the Middle East (and, indeed, from the entire world) has seemed unrelentingly grim. But rather than recount what has happened over the past three weeks, I wanted to share with you one small glimmer of hope I experienced recently.

I was recently contacted by Kristin Hansen on behalf of Blue Sky Waukesha, a local non-partisan progressive group that a number of CEEW members have been associated with. At the group's monthly meeting she wanted to hear from representatives of the Jewish and Muslim communities. She set specific, tight pa-

rameters about what the evening would and would not be. In her own words, "The purpose of this gathering is to help our members understand what their own community members and neighbors are going through because

of this war. I want people to hear directly from you (as opposed to through newspapers, or God forbid, suspect social media sites) what your communities feel, what the reactions are in your communities, how people can help, whether that's donations or calls to elected officials, how we who are not Jewish or Muslim can support you in this terrible time. This is NOT a debate. We are not here to find a 'solution' or try to decide issues far beyond our reach. But I did not want

BLUE SKY WAUKESHA my friends and neighbors to be suffering with silence all around them."

At this meeting I had an excellent conversation with Wassim Malas, who represents the Wisconsin Muslim Civic Alliance and resides in Menomonee Falls. Mr. Malas said before our meeting, "My approach to tonight's event isn't to 'win' the audience through argumentation or even by telling a story that's more captivating. I simply intend to tell the truth of what I believe is the position the Palestinians find themselves in and nothing more. I truly believe that US citizens here should set an example to the various groups fighting overseas. I hope Mr.

Levson and I can do the same." And that is exactly what both of us did. We did not argue about which side deserved more blame, and we did not attempt to solve the problems of the Middle East. Instead, we listened care-

fully to each other with respect and compassion for what each of our communities were going through during this difficult time. It was an important reminder to me that despite our significant differences, we can still find common ground for conversation.

Many of you have told me that prior to the pandemic and before changes in clergy, CEEW and the Brookfield Mosque had an excellent relationship. Before this meeting of Blue Sky
Waukesha, my thoughts were that
"this is not the right time to try to reestablish relations with the Mosque." I
am now of a mind that this is *precisely*the time to attempt to restore these
personal connections between our
two communities. I know many of
you have wondered what you can do
to help Israel during these dark days.
The World Union for Progressive Ju-



daism, the Milwaukee Jewish Federation, and many other organizations are coordinating a myriad number of ways that we can help. But I also believe that, in the words of Mr. Malas, "US citizens here should set an example to the various groups fighting overseas." I hope that we can make this happen in the weeks and months ahead.

Take care of yourselves, and pray for the peace of Jerusalem. ❖


## **CEEW Board Meeting: October 2023**

- I. D'var Torah and Spiritual Leader's Report by Cantor Levson: A prayer for the state of Israel was recited. It's been a difficult several days dealing with the horrors that were unleashed on Saturday. He apologized that he has not been able to respond to articles and messages sent to him. He reported that he is a bit overwhelmed at this challenging time. Cantor participated in a training program about values clarification for B'Mitzvot and is looking forward to bringing this to our congregation. He attended the service at Temple Shalom in response to the attack on Israel where over 900 people attended, and he was moved by the numbers and their fervent solidarity. *Am Israel Chai!*
- **II.** Education Director Report by Carrie Barbakoff: She has been hearing from people from all over the world. The family service for Simchat Torah was also a great success. The Jewish Education Project had a webinar on October 10 about how to talk to kids about the events in Israel stressing how to speak to children at their level. We are mindful of security measures, and it is important to carry on as usual.

a. Sophia: The vision of this organization is justice and the advancement of racial equality. They do not require a formal dues commitment. Mark Levy and Laurie Schwartz met with them and felt that their vision aligns well with ours vis a vis Tikkun

Olam. Ann moved that our congregation support this organization. Bernie seconded. Motion carried with one abstention. Laurie will talk with Kelly Goodman to come and make a presentation to the congregation.


#### b. Archival Work:

# Challenge and Resilience in Times of Adversity



Presidents letter to reflect the current state of affairs. Our daughter, her husband, and their two-year-old son landed safely at their home in Israel one day before the war in Israel. They had been visiting their United States family and friends here for three weeks during the High Holidays.

On that Shabbat and Simchat Torah (celebrated on Shabbat there in Israel), they had been up most of the wee

the rockets near Netanya from the last conflict in May 2021.

But now it was different. Social media became a blessing and a curse, consuming my family members as they read the horrific news of murder, kidnapping, and bestial violence by the Hamas terrorists. Their phones filled with inquiries of friends, former classmates, and family checking in. One by

one, many of their friends were called up for active duty. Our son-in-law was placed on "standby" as a medic having just completed three weeks of reserve exercises and training in August near Bet Shemesh.

Around 300,000 reservists have been called up to this point. Stores and day cares were closed. Routine life came to a standstill. Gradually the phone had to be put down as the death toll rose. Eventually, by the 4th day of the war, he was called up and the anxious waiting was over. Thank G-d, he was not sent to Gaza.



Yet as they were weary and sad, they were also thankful to have food and shelter. Family was nearby to give support. Everyone had lost someone or knew someone that had lost someone as the death toll mounted. They were safe. We spoke daily, and hopefully I helped her cope from afar.

But for me, it was different. I felt guilty that now, being an Israeli citizen, I should be there helping. I worried about my friends and family there. I had been there in May 2021 during the last major conflict as the sirens sounded and we took shelter with my then infant grandson. I felt a fear I had never experienced in the US. I felt protective of my grandson who was too young to understand the hatred Hamas has in their hearts for the Israelis.

However, I was very much heartened by all the concern and caring from so many people, both Jews and Gentiles, congregants and friends, many of whom I hadn't seen in a long time, and some I had just talked to the day before. The love they have for the State of Israel and the Jewish people gave me much hope. The people in Israel bonded together, and put aside their political differences to protect their country and support each other. Jewish communities both locally and afar created information sessions, concerts and fundraisers. The world lit up their buildings with blue and white. Is Jew hatred and Israel bashing gone from the Western world? One can only hope the support continues.

I also relied on my "emunah," the faith and trust and an innate conviction that there is a Creator in the World. I have always believed even as a young child that there is divine retribution for the evil in the world.

So dear Sisters, thank you for your support and I hope this letter finds us in good health with the terrible war in Israel behind us at the time of this publication. Reaching out and assisting at the synagogue is something I think Sisterhood does well. I hope you continue to reach out and join us in our activities. Sisterhood helped fund and organize many activities — most recently donating towards the Temple retreat, planning and executing a food drive, raising funds with the Chanukah card, and planning future programming for all women.

## The November Read: The Color of Water by James McBride

lthough this is a memoir, it is so much more. It became a New York Times best seller for two years, sold millions of copies, and has been translated into 16 languages. James McBride, a writer and musician, has received numerous awards for his work in musical theater as well as the Anisfield-Wolf Award for this book.

McBride's white Jewish mother, Ruth, was born in Poland but raised in the American South, the daughter of an itinerant rabbi and a loving, disabled mother who spoke no English. Ruth fled the south because of abuse, hardship, and poverty and ended up in Harlem. Here she married a Black man and had eight children (James was the youngest); when he died she married another Black man and had four



more children. All twelve children went on to become college educated. McBride saw his mother as an in-

spirational figure but one with many issues and secrets. He was an adult before he really knew the truth about Ruth as he searched for his roots (mostly against her wishes).

The title of the book comes from an early conversation with his mother where he asks, "Am I Black or White?" Her answer was that he was a human being and the color of water and water doesn't have a color. His mother did not acknowledge her whiteness, which often caused confusion for him.
