D'var Torah and Spiritual Leader's Report by Cantor Levson: There was a program with the 7th graders about the Jewish perspective on the solar eclipse including two relevant blessings. Cantor expressed thanks to the participants of the Purim Spiel, especially the board members who attended. Cantor and Ann Meyers took Hamantaschen to the Fox River Church across the street to welcome them. Passover is our central story that defines us, and we are looking forward to our Seder at Chenequa Country Club. The school has a wonderful new Haggadah with stories of ancient and modern heroes. There will be a Seder at the school next Sunday.

Education Director Report by Carrie Barbakoff: Both teachers will be returning next year. There will be a Yom HaShoah program on May 5 at 10:30 am and Dr Bronner will speak to the congregation and the students in 5th grade through post b'mitzvah. May 12 we will celebrate Yom HaAtzmaut and May 19 will be the last day of school.

President's Report by Laurie Schwartz: Requests for reports from the committees for the annual meeting have been sent out.

Treasurer/Financial Report by Alan Meyers: Although we are estimating a \$18,000 deficit for this fiscal year, it is better than what was projected. We need budget numbers from the committees. Brigette's contract is coming up for renewal. We will need to decide whether to increase teacher salaries and this will be discussed with Carrie Barbakoff. Alan will build next year's budget based on this year's numbers if people do not submit their requests. Sisterhood Report by Denise Stodola and Ann Meyers: Sisterhood donated \$500 to assist with Cantor's trip to Israel. We sent a get-well card and encouraged people to visit Mar-



sha Fensin. We decided to hold the annual meeting on June 2nd at the temple. We are putting together a nominating committee for the new officers for the coming year. We will be working with Carrie Barbakoff on some kind of activity during the Israel Independence Day celebrations.

Committee Reports

Facilities by Bernie Sandler: Everything is running smoothly and there is nothing of importance to report at this time.

Security by Mark Levy: We continue to work on the video, alarm, and key systems. We are still waiting for some members to return their old door keys.

Old Business - Laurie Schwartz:

Bulletin: June will be the last monthly bulletin. We continue to explore alternatives to communicate with the membership. Mark will continue to generate the weekly newsletter and we will update the website as needed.

Ethics Policy by Ann Meyers: A proposed ethics policy was presented for consideration, but it was tabled until the May meeting when the grievance policy can be presented and discussed at the same time. **‡**

The May Read: *One Hundred Saturdays* by Michael Frank

Travel Tales from CEEW My Trip to Costa Rica by Mari-Claire Zimmerman



In March my husband and I went to Costa Rica. I had visions of trekking through a jungle, but in reality, our visit was much tamer than that. A friend of mine owns a duplex condo unit which she rents out when she is not there using it. This is at Hermosa Heights, at Playa Hermosa.

We flew from Chicago with one plane change in Houston to Liberia, where there is a small airport. Liberia and Hermosa are on the Pacific side of Costa Rica. Our condo was within walking distance to the beach, to some restaurants, and to a small grocery store that had a lot of familiar products.



At the beach there were a lot of shade trees, so we relaxed in comfort on beach chairs. I had a great massage and bought a beautiful vase, a moonstone necklace, and a coconut filled with coconut milk and rum. Another day, we took a day cruise in a bay of the Pacific and snorkeled in the clear water. We went to an island where white-faced monkeys hang out in the trees. Our boat captain held up pieces of fresh pineapple which the monkeys came down to grab and eat.

The condo complex included a warm swimming pool, a fish store of local fish for eating, a wine store, and a movie theater. The condo was comfortable with all the comforts of home, except that at times the water pressure was low to non-existent.

Our concierge at the condos picked-us up from the airport, arranged the boat trip, took us to some delicious restaurants, and arranged for a professional private tour for other days. He also drove us to a clinic when Bill had abdominal pain. The doctors spoke excellent English, as did most of the people we encountered.

We spent time in a nearby city called Playa Coco where there are restaurants from many nationalities including Mexican, Italian, Chinese, India, and more. We met a Jewish shopkeeper there and he and I sang



Hava N'gila and Heveinu Shalom Aleichem.

The private tours were to a couple of waterfalls where we could swim in the pools at the bottom, to visit a hot springs and hot mud outdoor spa, to some national forests, to another boat tour on a river and to a portion of the rain forest. We saw the boiling mud pools and sulfur water pools near an active volcano.

Our guide also took us to delicious lunches at restaurants in the areas of our tours. In the rain forest we saw a poison dart frog, a sloth, and more monkeys. Earlier in the day he also took us to a wild animal refuge for animals that

should be wild but can no longer be released into the wild due to earlier abuse by people, being too comfortable with humans, injuries, or being orphaned. Owning wild animals as pets is illegal in Costa Rica, and this includes parrots.

Some interesting things about Costa Ri-

ca: The popular greeting and answer to "how are you?" is "Pura Vida." This means "pure life." You should not flush toilet paper in Costa Rica as the plumbing pipes are not wide enough to tolerate much of it. Every toilet has a garbage can nearby.

We drove down Highway 1, which is the Costa Rican section of the Pan-American highway that goes from Alaska to the southern tip of



Chile and Argentina. In the U.S. this is California's Highway 101.

March is summer in Costa Rica; their rainy season is from June through November. There are a lot of dry trees in March and they look like our trees do when they lose their leaves in winter. Others are full of leaves and flowers. In March the temperature is in the mid-80's to mid-90's, so we wore hats and sunscreen and had plenty to drink.

The restaurants have outdoor seating, some under canopies or roofs without walls. Cats and dogs wander around and seem comfortable hanging out at the establishments. The restaurants have signs "please don't feed the animals."

On the roads, the signs to warn of animals crossing the highways don't show deer, but show monkeys, long tailed rac-

> coons, iguanas, and other animals that we don't see here. During a financial transaction you can use dollars, Costa Rican colones, or (frequently) charge cards. Tips are included on the bill at restaurants as "service" and are always 10%, but leaving a small amount in addition to this is acceptable.

Our visit was fun, relaxing, and very informational. \clubsuit
