Reflection and Renewal

he following thoughts are based on my Spiritual Leader Report for the 2024 CEEW Annual Meeting, which will be held on Sunday morning, June 9, at 9:00 AM. Please make every effort to attend. We will feed you bagels (with lox!) if you do.

"Der mentsh trakht un got lakht." That's Yiddish for "Human beings make plans, and God laughs." Full disclosure: when I was thinking about my High Holiday sermons this past year, I thought about making one of them about the protests for democracy that had been attended by hundreds of thousands of Israelis in the summer of 2023. In the end, I abandoned that idea, because I thought "What's going on in Israel right now really isn't on the majority of my congregants' radar."

And then... October 7 happened. The deadly pogrom initiated by Hamas on that horrible day and the war that immediately followed has consumed a great deal of my time as

well as my intellectual and spiritual energy. I have felt it my sacred responsibility to be as informed as possible about events in Israel and Gaza this past year, because as your Spiritual Leader I know that I will be asked many questions about *Hamatzav* ("The Situation") both by congregants and by the larger community. From my position of privilege and safety here in Waukesha, WI, I can advocate for Israel's need (and absolute right) to defend itself after that horrible terrorist attack and express compassion and sorrow for the enormous suffering that has been inflicted upon the residents of Gaza.



I firmly believe and maintain that these two viewpoints are not mutually exclusive. I am grateful for the unqualified support of my fellow clergy in both the Association of Waukesha Clergy and BEGIN (Brookfield - Elm Grove Interfaith Network) for their unwavering support. They have our backs, and they have said that if (God forbid!) an anti-Semitic act occurs against CEEW, they will be there to support us at a moment's notice.

This past June I accompanied our Director of Education Carrie Barbakoff and Ann Meyers as we took our "Jewish Adulting" class on a fantastic trip to New York City. Because we had four 7th grade students in our Religious School this year, I taught this group of inquisitive students on Sunday mornings. Our Wednesday morning "Midrash" adult education class explored the thought provoking (and often deliciously subversive) book Judaism Disrupted: A Spiritual

Manifesto for the 21st Century by Rabbi Michael Strassfeld. Over the past few weeks, we have had some intense discussions about Israel and Gaza, and the effect *Hamatzav* has had on our lives as Jews here in Wisconsin.

As I complete the last year of my initial three-year contract, I am im-

mensely grateful for the sacred opportunity to continue to serve as the Sole/Soul Spiritual Leader of Congregation Emanu-El for the next (God willing!) five years. We may be small in numbers, but we have a vibrant, meaningful, and immensely welcoming expression of Progressive Judaism here in

Waukesha County. We are the only non-Orthodox Jewish community between Milwaukee and Madison, and I am honored by your continuing confidence in me. Together, may we go from strength to strength!

Yom HaShoah at CEEW

On Sunday May 5, CEEW Sunday school included a special program in honor of Yom HaShoah with some of the school students, CEEW members and a special speaker, Simon Bronner from UW-Milwaukee.

Dr. Bronner talked about his Polish Jewish family and their experiences during WWII. His parents met in a displacement camp, married, and moved to Israel where he grew up. Eventually the family relocated to Chicago and New York; he now lives and works here in the Milwaukee and Waukesha area. Although his parents didn't talk much about their experiences during the war (as many surviving persons did not), he was able to piece together much of what happened with family members, one of whom was on "Schindler's List" and thus managed to survive.

With the use of a power point and pictures, his was a story well told and memorable to hear about, and we thank him for sharing this with our CEEW congregation and school. It is important to hear, share, and continue to tell about this part of our Jewish history. We should never forget.

As part of the service six candles were lit, with each one representing one million who perished in the Holocaust. Candles were lit by Carrie Barbakoff (for Peter Shelley), Cantor Levson (for Marsha Fensin's family), Elly Kraines, Adrian Richfield, Cindy Levy, and Simon Bronner. Cantor Levson sang a well known song by poet Hannah Szenes: "Eili Eili."


May 3 Special Shabbat: Mark and Cindy Levy

D'var Torah and Spiritual Leader's Report by Cantor Levson: We are coming to the end of Yom HaZikaron, a challenging issue for us in the diaspora. Like Memorial Day we are used to celebrations and parades, but not so for the Memorial Day in Israel. Everybody knows someone who has been killed defending the state, so this is a serious and solemn occasion. Then we transition to Yom HaAtzmaut, Independence Day. This year it will be more difficult because of the Oct 7 event, the hostages, and ongoing conflict. Coming up: June will have three B'Mitvah services: June 1 Rylan Ecker, June 15 Ava Koszarek, and June 22 Sxdni Small.

Education Director Report by Carrie Barbakoff: Sunday May 19 will be the last day of Sunday school. September 8 starts religious school for the next year. We are anticipating a smaller school in the coming year with only nine Sunday School students and four Jewish Adulting students.

President's Report by Laurie Schwartz: Nothing to report.

Treasurer/Financial Report by Alan Meyers: (For details, contact Alan Meyers) A proposed budget has been put together and is included in the year end estimate report with the following changes: a. The Cantor's new contract is covered using the Spiritual Leader fund that we created using an anonymous donation and donations from our members, b. We budgeted for only two teachers this year instead of the usual four.

Sisterhood Report by Denise Stodola: The Sunshine Committee sent out cards to the Marsha Fensin family.

The Sisterhood Annual Meeting is June 2 at 11:30 and will be catered by Sendik's and the Sisterhood board. We will make a donation to ABCD



Breast Cancer support group charity in honor of Marsha Fensin. We will be presenting gifts to the B'nai Mitzvot.


Committee Reports

Facilities and Security by Bernie Sandler:

Items completed: Alarm testing completed, and the temple will be armed every night and 11-6. A few people will have to be trained to manage the system. Training and demonstration will be offered during the annual meeting. The fire safety violations are resolved, elevator issues were resolved with a service call, the tree on the northwest corner which suffered severe damage has been trimmed.

Items in progress: Old door locks will be replaced with a new code. The alarms will be turned on once the keys are distributed. We will schedule an information-and-training meeting with the temple membership. Old keys are requested to be turned in. We are looking for a replacement for the GFL trash removal service. Mark Levy and Bernie Sandler are obtaining proposals regarding replacement or upgrade to our 20-year-old HVAC system and components. Decisions are TBD.

Items needing attention and decisions: We need to plan a one-day service effort to complete site improvement including weed pulling, buying and spreading mulch. We need to decide about removing the dead tree either by ourselves or with a professional service. We need to remove a stump on the south side, and we need to fix the HVAC air flow controls in the cantor's office.

The June Read: Kantika by Elizabeth Graver


ebecca Cohen's happy childhood ended abruptly in 1914 in Constantinople, when Turkey became intolerant of the Jewish population and her father relocated to Barcelona. Rebecca then endures a failed marriage, an odyssey to Cuba for an arranged marriage, and then the challenge of raising not only her two sons but her disabled stepdaughter. This is the story of a very resilient woman who must manage her old family with her new family. She does not give up: she fights for what she thinks is right as her life moves forward, sidewards, and diagonally.

Kantika, Ladino for "song," is a multi-generational story that moves between Istanbul, Barcelona, Havana, and New York to describe one family's displacement and explore issues of identity and exile as well. Kantika was selected by the New York Times as a 2023 Best Historical Novel and Nota-

ble Book of the Year and by NPR as a Best Book of 2023.

From the author: "The question was, is this fiction or not? I didn't have the necessary information or details to make it a work of non-fiction, and yet here I was incorporating these non-fictional aspects of my grandmother's life into what I was writing. So, *Kantika* became an improvisation between fact, fiction, research, dreams, texts, photographs, real names and invented ones, my grandmother and myself."

Graver teaches at Boston College.

She received her B.A. from Wesleyan University and her M.F.A. from Washington University in St. Louis.

She is married and the mother of two grown daughters.
